

FRENCH FLIER AFTER GOING 800 MILES WITHOUT STOP CAPTURED BY AUSTRIANS

PARIS, Aug. 18.—Lieut. Antoine's most amazing flights of the war birdmen; after completing one of the most amazing flights of the war. Starting from Nancy he flew the breadth of Germany, covering over 800 miles without pause or descent till recently trouble with his spark plugs obliged him to descend near Chelm, Russian Poland. He was captured by the Austrians.

Marchal's mission was to cross all German at a low altitude, making his flight all the more precarious, and to distribute as he went proclamations to the people and especially in and around Berlin. These notices began: "We could bombard the open city of Berlin, killing your women and children; but we are content only to drop the following proclamations."

Marchal has been interned near Salzburg and from there he has written post cards home describing the flight and giving an account of the engine trouble that brought him down. He has also expressed a determination to resume and complete his little chore so soon as he is free of the Austrians' clutches.
