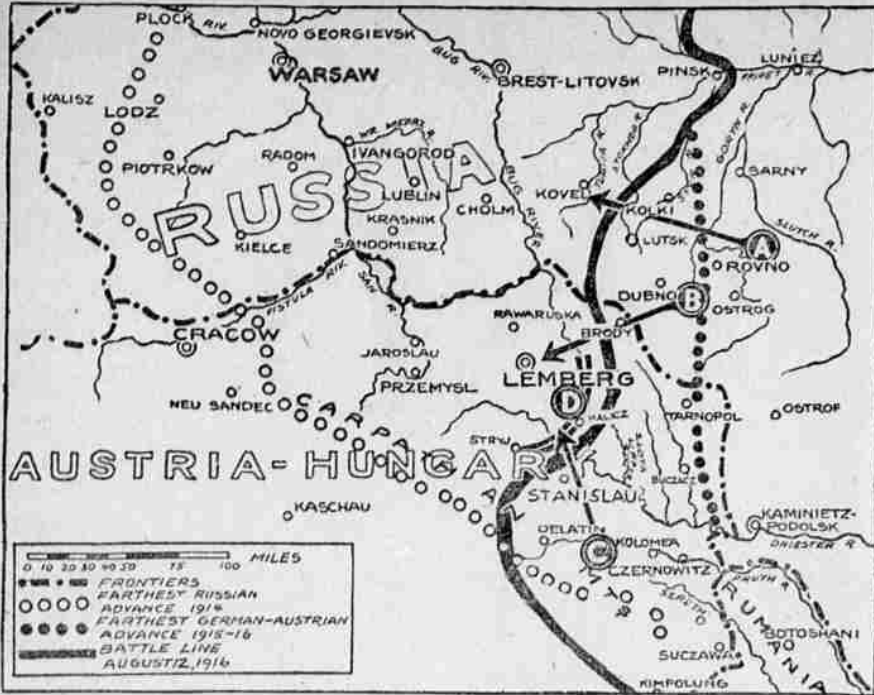


RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE SHOWS NO SIGNS OF LETTING UP



The map shows the location and progress of the Russian offensive. The arrows A, B, and C indicate the three main offensives. In the space between B and C the Russians have forced a considerable retirement along a line from Tarnopol south to Bucacz. The arrow A marks the renewed offensive against Kovel. The arrow B shows the drive of General Sakharoff, who aims at the Galicia stronghold of Lemberg from Brody. Arrow C shows General Lechitsky's advance toward Halicz, the key to Lemberg, from Stanislaw. The arrow D shows the position of General von Bothmer's army falling back before the Russians.
