Pastry—No. 68

To do justice to the subject of pastry would require a large amount of space with an increased number of installments, so as to save time I will choose just a few of my favorites in this particular pastry line.

Mother has a recipe that has always been my pride and I never tire of making it. There is very seldom a special dinner given that butterscotch pie does not provide the necessary "punch," as we say in the pictures when we mean an interesting climax, for our meal. I made a small pie the other day and sent it around to Kathryn Williams. Kathryn has now acquired the habit of asking me to make one of these every time she entertains.

Butterscotch Pie.—Put the yolk of one egg in a saucepan. Add one cup of brown sugar, two tablespoonfuls of flour, one cup of milk, three tablespoonfuls of water, two tablespoonfuls of lard, one quarter teaspoonful of salt, and one teaspoonful of extract of vanilla. Stir over the fire until it thickens and comes to a boiling point. Pour into baked pie shell. Beat up the white of egg, then beat one tablespoonful of powdered sugar into it. Spread on the top of the pie and brown lightly in the oven. This mixture will be sufficient for one pie.

One day, not long ago, while taking some exterior scenes for my next photoplay, "The Right Direction," I decided to take a picnic and surprise the rest of the company by offering them this morsel as a climax to their lunch, so to speak. For some unknown reason I left the pie on the seat of the big automobile which brought us all over from the studio. The departure of the said pie from this earthly existence was quick and painless, to the pie, but not to the players, after I had told them of the said affair.

The wrath of the members of the company only subsided after I promised to bake another one for the next trip on "location."

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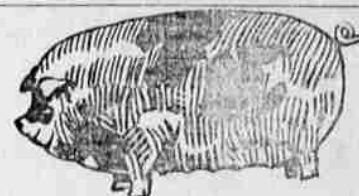
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
