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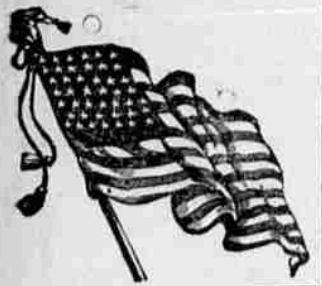

WHAT GEORGE DID.

Well, George has come and gone, and it is a safe assertion to say that neither his presence or his two hours' talk has made a single convert to the cause he represented. He was presented to the large audience by Attorney Coshaw as the "George who did things". There is something peculiar about the name of George, and the manner in which history has of associating events or qualifications to some particular ones that they may be distinguished from the common herd bearing the same name. England had one most particularly remembered by Americans, and he was called George The Third; we in our own land have a George known to every school boy as "The Father of His Country," and now by the efforts of one of our own citizens, the only and original Oregon George will be perpetuated on the scrolls of fame as "George The Deer," or "George The Digger," we leave it to the students of grammar in our public schools which term they prefer to use. The senator touched the high spots of "constructive legislation" but forgot to give the republican party credit for having started the legislation, he forgot to state that the Vreeland bill was a measure passed by the republican party placing the cash in the treasury at the disposal of the people to prevent panics; he forgot to state that as chairman of the senate military committee he knew why the American soldiers were sent into Mexico and were murdered at Carrizal, but he did say their fate was their own fault because they thought the greasers would not fight. Yes, George "did this". He made the weakest defense of the labor law passed under the guise of the Adamson bill ever heard on a platform, and coming from one who participated in this legislation, his denials of coercion or force were the flimsiest excuses. He did not tell why living is so much higher and constantly increasing, despite the pledge of his party four years ago. The senator did tell, to the surprise of the well informed of his audience, but h-u-m-b, this should be told to whippersnads and very confidentially, he did make mention of s-e-a-n-d-a-l and scandalmongers. Yes he "did," and as he is lately from Washington he ought to know.

GOMPERS' MISREPRESENTATION.

There is a developing serious question among labor leaders as to whether Samuel Gompers has not betrayed labor and the federation of

which he is the head by advocating the Adamson bill and supporting President Wilson because of it. In November, 1914, the American Federation of Labor adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the American Federation of Labor, as in the past, declares that the regulation of wages and hours of labor should be undertaken through trades union activity and not by legislation, except insofar as the employment of women and children, health and morals, and the employees of the national, state and municipal governments are affected."

This same resolution was adopted again in November, 1915. How Mr. Gompers can reconcile his present attitude with that resolution stands unexplained. The result which the federation wisely foresaw is rapidly approaching. Railway managers are already asserting that by the Hepburn bill congress has fixed the rates which the railways may charge; that by the LaFollette bill (providing a maximum of 16 hours) congress has fixed hours of labor; that by the Adamson bill congress has fixed the wages of 20 per cent of the railway employees; and that it remains only for congress to fix the compensation of the remaining 60 per cent and then by law to prohibit strikes, and all labor controversies on common carriers will be forestalled for all time. As one labor leader warns his fellow unionists, "Do you want your organization to become simply an insurance association, and have your hours, wages and grievances disposed of by legislation? That is just what the Adamson law means."

GEORGE ADE'S POSITION.

George Ade, former active Indiana progressive, but best known as the author of "Fables in Slang," has announced his determination to support Mr. Hughes. In his explanation of his course he says: "When I recall what has happened to this country during the past three years I pity all the good men who are sitting around benumbed by repeated insults and bewildered to learn that their native land is regarded by the rest of the world as a joke, but the large share of my pity is reserved for the poor historian of 50 years from now who will have to explain away our shame so that school children will believe it. Of late Mr. Wilson has been talking preparedness, but his voice doesn't sound natural. Why did he have to wait eighteen months after the European war broke out to discover that we needed a regular army and navy? He did not speak out on the preparedness issue until democratic politicians had worn a path to the White House telling him what he had better say if he wanted to be re-elected. The democrats said in 1912 that they would reduce the cost of living. All necessities and staples are now higher than ever before. We do not blame the democrats for high prices. We do blame them for continually making idle promises. For instance, how about their definite promise to enforce economy and trim down appropriations? They have been in the pork barrel up to their elbows."

HUGHES ON ADAMSON BILL.

Gov. Hughes continues to pour hot shot into the administration because of the Adamson bill. Asserting at Newark, that it was nothing less than deception to call it an "eight hour bill," Mr. Hughes quoted the statement of Senator Underwood of Alabama in the senate debate. Replying to another senator, Mr. Underwood said:

"If the senator would go and consult with any of the gentlemen who represent the employees and who have been contending here in this matter, they would tell him candidly, as they told me, that the question is a question of wage; that they are not contending for an eight hour day, that a man shall work only eight hours; they do not want that."

Mr. Hughes is showing up in conclusive manner the absolute hypocrisy of President Wilson's persistent misrepresentation of the Adamson bill as an "eight hour" bill. "What is the purpose of this attempt to make the public believe that this bill fixes an eight-hour work day?" inquired Mr. Hughes, answering his own question thus: "Manifestly, in order to endeavor to justify this extraordinary action of the administration in its subtle and humiliating surrender of principle in demanding and securing this legislation without any proper inquiry, as the price of peace. Evidently, it is felt that a wage increase could not be justified in this manner. What is fair and right can afford to be described correctly and can stand on its merits." Referring to President Wilson's assertion that "the eight-hour day has the sanction of the judgment of scientists," Mr. Hughes demanded to

know, if that were true and he had been an eight-hour bill, how President Wilson dared to limit the eight-hour benefit to 20 per cent of the most highly paid railway employees and leave all the others to work far longer hours. He also warned the labor men that the Adamson bill was very likely to prove a boomerang to labor, because with eight hours made the basis of a day's work, those men who completed their runs in less than eight hours were in grave danger of being compelled to turn to other work and put in the full eight hours.
