FINE MEETING AT LOOKING GLASS

Attorney B. L. Eddy Discusses the Brewer's Amendment.

An exceptionally large audience was present last night at Looking Glass to listen to the address of Hon. B. L. Eddy on the subject of the brewer's amendment. The meeting was held in the church building which was crowded to capacity by the large audience.

From the standpoint of an attorney, Mr. Eddy, proved that the amendment which is proposed by the liquor element to pass would throw the state wide open. It repeals all other prohibition measures and in addition allows beer to be sold to minors or an person whomsoever. It would make it possible to obtain liquor at any place or at any time, putting Oregon in a much worse position than it was before prohibition was endorsed as no license could

be demanded.

DOUGLAS COUNTY READY TO HELP

Is Ready to Make Survey if Commission Favors Route.

County Judge R. W. Marsters, of Douglas county, appeared before the state highway commission at a meeting yesterday to announce that Douglas county is willing to make a survey of seventeen miles of highway within its borders between Roseburg and the Coos Bay country if the commission will favor the route.

A delegation from Lane and Coos counties recently appeared before the commission seeking state aid in building a road from the Coos bay points to Eugene by way of Reedsport and Florence. Judge Marsters stated that he would have surveys prepared and submitted to the commission. No action was taken as the matter has already been placed in the hands of an advisory committee. —Salem Statesman.

ASSAULTS POLICIES OF ADMINISTRATION

have been lost, more people have been killed in Mexico during times of peace than in the entire Spanish-American war, while the amount of money spent has been almost twice as much. Battles have been fought; Mexican and American soldiers being killed by the same kind of bullets shot from the same kind of guns. The American nation furnishing the enemy with the ammunition and arms with which to do the fighting. Had a little firmness been displayed on the part of the administration, this would not have been the result. There would have been no widows as a result of frays at Vera Cruz, Tampico and Carrizal. There would have been no women and children slaughtered at Colum bus, the Americans in Mexico would have been protected and the United States could have looked with pride at its policy instead of with shame at the disgrace unprecedented in history.

The broken pledge in regard to the exemption of American ships in the Panama canal was also discussed. During the campaign of 1912 the democrats supported the measure which had been passed by the republican congress, exempting the American coastwise vessels passing through the canal from paying the toll required of vessels of other nations. As soon, however, as they had come into power they immediately repealed this bill and now any vessel carrying lumber from the Pacific coast to the eastern or European market must pay a toll of \$1.20 per net ton for going through the canal which was built with our own money and now under our own management.

The ultimate effect of the Adamson law showing that this would undoubtedly be repealed immediately following the election and a compulsory arbitration law substituted was presented by the speaker. During the past four years of the democratic congress it has been shown that they have made many changes of this nature, and after the election has taken place and they are sure of their position for another term they will then proceed to pass such legislation as they desire regardless of the wishes of laboring men.

It was shown that President Wilson has always been opposed to organized labor and on several occasions recommended the importation of Chinese labor in order to force down the wages. He was also shown to be in favor of compulsory arbitration, along the line followed by the Canadian government and that he would undoubtedly coerce con-

gress into passing such a law following his re-election, in the same manner as he had forced that body to pass the Adamson law.

Mr. Adams is a very pleasing speaker, his voice and personality are well fitted for the work and he delivers a logical, clear cut address without the high-flown rhetoric and gesticulations of many of the stump speakers. His evidence is undisputable and his logic impressive.
