Teacher Persuades Famous Blind Girl to Break Engagement.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 21.—Helen Keller, the famous deaf and blind girl, has abandoned a matrimonial career for the sake of the woman who has enabled her to learn to talk and offset her innate infirmities, Mrs. John A. Macy.

Miss Keller was engaged to Peter Fagon, a young socialist, who became acquainted with her while a reporter for a Boston newspaper and was employed by her as secretary. But romance came into her life much against the wishes of Mrs. Macy, on whom she is absolutely dependent for communication with the world, for the development of her powers of speech and observation, and to whom she is indebted practically for her life. Mrs. Macy's opposition to her pupil's marriage was based not on selfishness, but on realization that it would hinder the further development of a marvelous girl, and so the romance has been shattered. AUTO PLANT FOR PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, Nov. 21.—Although negotiations are not completed, every indication points to the construction of an assembling plant for the Chevrolet Motor Company, on a half block owned by W. C. Garland, on Savier street between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth.

The company has an option which does not expire until the middle of December. Meanwhile wreckers are tearing down the 15 small frame houses that encumber the 100 by 200 foot site.

According to information so far received, the Chevrolet interests will expend about \$100,000 on the plant and it would give employment to about 75 men. Local representatives of the Chevrolet Motor Company have received preliminary instructions regarding the proposed building.

BOY CONFERENCE NEXT MONTH

The 11th annual state older boys' conference for western Oregon is to be held at Corvallis, December 1, 2 and 3, and it is expected that several of the older boys from this city will be in attendance. The conference is under the Young Men's Christian Association and the State Sunday School Association. The program will be excellent and will include among the speakers President W. J. Kerr, of the Oregon Agricultural College; Eugene Vincent, of Portland, president of the 1915 conference; Earl J. Cummins, field secretary for Oregon in the social hygiene societies; Will S. Hale, superintendent of the Oregon state training school, and Professor Norman Coleman, of Reed college. Reduced railroad rates will be given.
