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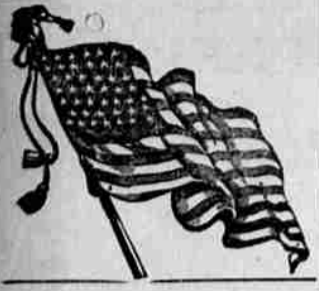

WOULD ELECT DIRECT.

ANNUAL BUDGET BEING PREPARED

County Court Met Today in Special Session to Forecast Expenditures.

ST JOHN IN ATTENDANCE

Newly Elected Commissioner Present and Listens to Arrangements Being Made By the County Court.

The county court met today in special session and commenced the laborious task of forming the budget of county expenses for the coming year. W. E. St. John, who was recently elected was invited to be present, and although not taking a seat in official capacity, was present to follow the action of the court in preparing the funds for the offices and expenses for the coming year.

Strict economy is the watchword of the session. Officers have been asked to eliminate all unnecessary expenses and it is believed that the total amount will be lower than last year in spite of the much greater amount of work being done. The court, however, is taking into consideration the fact that although the budget is to be reduced that the efficiency of the offices must not be lessened and with this in view are very carefully considering the different estimates which are being brought to them.

Road funds, court funds, traveling expenses, materials, and many other items separate from salaries and office expenses must be taken into consideration, arranged and totaled so that the court will know approximately how to go about the year's work and in what direction the money which will be raised by taxes and other means is to be spent.

As yet the officers have not all filed their estimates. The estimate of the assessor's office was \$1000, less than last year and including books, stationery and miscellaneous expenses, is about \$6950. The treasurer's office remains practically the same as last year, \$1800 being asked for salaries and expenses, with \$100 for incidental expenses. The school superintendent placed his estimate slightly lower than last time, asking on this occasion for approximately \$4700, while the sheriff and clerk's offices it is thought will be about the same.

The budget will be completed within a few days it is believed and an estimate will be placed on the various amounts which the court expects to spend.

Although the court does not intend to take up the matters outside the budget it was agreed today that the bridge at Riddle should be raised about four feet, as last year it was partially wrecked by the high water and it safety is feared for in the event of more hard rains.

WILL INSTALL MORE LOCKERS.

Captain J. A. Buchanan returned last night from Portland where he attended a meeting of the general military staff. Only routine matters were attended to among them being an order for the installation of ten more lockers in the local armory for the accommodation of the members of the medical department.

ELECTORAL COLLEGE CRITICISED

Present System is Cumbersome and Not Representative.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 21.—Governor Withycombe has issued a statement favoring the reorganization of the electoral college.

"It is my opinion that the operation of the electoral college, as at present constituted, does not give fair representation to the people of the several states nor to the selection of a president necessarily representing the actual choice of the majority of the voters," says the statement in part. "However, the absolute substitution of popular vote for the electoral college would of necessity give the overwhelming preponderance of power to the half a dozen thickly populated eastern states. This would be as unjust as the present method which now gives the south a representation proportioned upon its population and not upon its actual vote.

As a remedy, the best remedy is a reorganization of the electoral vote in two respects: First, let each state vote directly for president without the cumbersome participation of

electors, its allotted electoral vote then being counted for the winning ticket; and, second, readjust the existing apportionment of electoral votes among the states upon a basis of the number of actual voters participating in the election and not upon population."

RECOMMENDS POTATO BREAD.

Potato bread is not alone a ration for the war-stricken peoples but also a very pleasing and nourishing food which any American housewife can prepare by using a recipe made up by the department of agriculture. It calls for 3 pounds of boiled and mashed potatoes and 2 1/2 pounds of wheat flour. Bread made with these materials has a rich brown crust, an appetizing odor, a very agreeable taste, and will keep fresh several days longer than ordinary bread.—From the December Popular Mechanics Magazine.
