BRIEF TELEGRAPHIC NOTES OF INTEREST

SON JOSE, Cal., Jan. 21.—Rasmus Arronson, wealthy orchardist, of Madras, 10 miles south of here, was killed this afternoon by the explosion of a sack of dynamite which he was carrying. The body was badly mutilated.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Mormon church has seized the opportunity caused by the war to start proselyting on the most far reaching scale ever attempted in England.

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—British cargo steamer Lyndenhall, arriving here from Naples, brought a tale of a battle off Sicily on the last trip across, during which a submarine was fought off with a little 12-lb. gun mounted at the ship's stern. Thirty shells out of about 200 fired by the submarine, it was stated, hit the steamer, but none in a vital place.

BERLIN, Jan. 21.—A definite split has taken place in the ranks of the national socialist party, according to a statement given out by the Overseas News agency.

A committee of the German socialist party met and decided to separate from the "Anarchist wing," which means a definite split in the party, said the semi-official press bureau. The cause of the split is a discussion of opinion concerning party policy with regard to the conduct of the war.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Senator Jones, of Washington, Saturday presented a resolution passed by the Yakima, Wash., Trades and Labor council of Seattle asking for a congressional investigation of the I. W. W. at Everett, Wash., November 5, 1916, in which seven were killed and many injured.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 21.—Betty de Jong, an artist well known in the Bohemian set of San Francisco, is probably dying with a bullet in her head, and police are questioning Dr. William S. Porter, prominent society physician of Oakland, who was alone with her in her studio Saturday night when the shooting occurred.

Dr. Porter told the police the artist shot herself.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—A plan which can be depended upon to interest many women on the Pacific coast is one providing for the enrollment of women aviators in the army aviation reserve corps. The plan is fathered by Lawrence Sperry, a young aviator of New York. He has interested Major General Leonard Wood in the plan and as a result Mrs. Waldo Pierce, an aviator, has been granted permission to fly at Governors Island.

The military purpose of the woman's reserve corps would be the watching for enemy aircraft in time of war, carrying information and doing a score of useful things only slightly less hazardous than actual air fighting which would be left to the men. Rear Admiral Peary and other prominent military and aeronauts have endorsed the plan, stating that the recent exploit of Miss Ruth Law has demonstrated the ability of women to handle aircraft.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Applicants for 640 acre homesteads under the new grazing lands act who wish to establish preference claims for certain tracts should file their applications with the local land office, accompanied by petitions in duplicate for the designation of the land desired.

This information is given Representative Sinnott by the general land office.

All applications, it is understood, will follow the same channel, being transmitted from the local land office, with petitions for designation of particular tracts. Preference will then be established for those who first applied for the land and at the same time filed duplicate petitions for designation.
