NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Sealed proposals, addressed to the County Clerk of Douglas County, Oregon, and endorsed "Proposal for Constructing The Myrtle Creek Hill Section of the Douglas County Highway Improvement," will be received by the county court of Douglas County, at its office in the Court House in Roseburg, Oregon, until 4 o'clock P. All proposals must be made upon blank form to be obtained from the county clerk, at his office at the court house, Roseburg, Oregon; must give the prices proposed, both in writing and figures, and must be signed by the bidder, with his address.
Each bid is to be presented under sealed cover, and shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond made payable to Douglas County, or a cer-

tified check made payable to the county clerk of Douglas County, for an amount equal to at least five per cent of the amount of said bid, and no bid shall be considered unless such cash, bond or check is enclosed therewith. Such bidder's bond shall be conditioned that if said bid be accepted, the party bidding will duly enter into and execute the contract.
