

MAIDS TO HELP ENLISTMENTS.

SALEM, Or., March 19.—Branches of the Girls' Honor Guard have been organized in McMinnville, Dallas, Corvallis and Woodburn, and another is under way for Salem to assist in getting enlistments for militia companies to be kept up at any one up the "slackers".

Lieutenant Dana H. Allen, of Company M, national guard, of this city, has returned from a visit to valley towns, where militia companies are stationed, with optimistic reports of the campaign being made to recruit these companies to the required strength.

Lieutenant Allen was delegated by Adjutant-General White to have supervisory charge of the work in the valley.

"The sentiment of the citizens in all of these cities is that the guard companies are to be kept at any cost," said Lieutenant Allen today. "The citizens' committees in each of the towns is actively working toward that end, and we expect to have the heartiest kind of co-operation from the girls."

Instructions have gone out from Miss Lucile Danforth, of Portland, to all of the Honor Guards in the cities where militia companies are situated to take an active part in getting recruits for the national guard.

DEATH OF REV. J. M. REESE.

Rev. J. M. Reese was born in Franklin county, Indiana, December 6, 1840, and died March 18, 1917, at his home in West Roseburg, Ore. He was married to Miss Urzilla Sult, December 21, 1862, the fruit of this union being eight children, of which number five have preceded him to the glory world, where they are awaiting the coming of their parents. In the latter part of the Civil war he served in an Indiana regiment after which he returned home to his family. The place of the marriage of Mr. Reese and Miss Sult was at Connersville, Indiana. At the age of 25 years, Rev. Reese was gloriously saved of the Lord and at that time he joined the Methodist Episcopal church and about the year 1855 he cast his lot with the Free Methodist church, and a number of past years has held the position of local deacon, and at times he with his consecrated wife, who is also an evangelist, had the pastorate of many churches where they fearlessly preached the Gospel and carried the message of salvation to many homes and hearts, while traveling over the mountains and valleys of southwest Oregon and many will remember their visitations, earnest prayers and soul-inspiring sermons and be glad to know that the same Gospel he preached to others sustained him in the last hours of his stay on earth. While visiting him the evening before his decease we asked him how he was resting, and he replied "Fine." We then said "You have soul rest." He said "If I did not have soul rest now, I don't know what I should do."

The funeral services were largely attended by old soldiers, citizens and friends, evidencing the respect they had for the deceased. The next wife and three children, Mrs. Lillie White, of eastern Oregon; Mrs. Bertha Robertson, and Mr. Charles Reese, of Roseburg, do not weep as those who have no hope. The services were conducted by the pastor, assisted by Mrs. Nettie Bryant, Text, Second Corinthians, fifth chapter, first verse.

His remains were laid in the soldiers' cemetery to await the sounding of the trumpet of the Lord.

NEW AUTO RULES.

Slow-moving vehicles must keep as far to the right of the road as practicable, to permit swiftly-moving vehicles reasonably free passage to the left.

Before starting, driver must first see there is room to turn or back into road, and must give visible signals to warn oncoming vehicles of his intent.

Ambulances and physicians' autos are exempted from speed limits only when answering emergency calls.

Lights must be dimmed, or so directed that rays shall strike the ground not to exceed 75 feet in front of vehicle.

No metal block, stud or head permitted to project more than a quarter inch from tire.

No glass bottles, nails, tacks, hoops, wire or cans permitted to be thrown on highways.

No person, other than a law officer, permitted to climb into an auto or monkey with the cranks or levers without the owner's or driver's permission.

No person under 15 years of age permitted to drive car unless parent, guardian or owner is in the car.
