FORMER CZAR MAY BE UNDER ARREST

Orders Said to Have Been Issued For Detention of Nicholas.

MOVIE JOB IS OFFERED

Exiled Russian Thinks That Czar Nicholas Might Make a Good Drawing Card in "Easy" America.

LONDON, March 21.—A special dispatch from Petrograd declared that the provisional government has ordered the former czar and czarina to be arrested and taken to Tsarko-Selo. Other dispatches state that the czar will "soon join his family at Tsarko-Selo."

Apparently the new Russia government begun making wholesale arrests of royalty immediately after announcing political amnesty, and several high dignitaries of the Russian church are reported among those in detention. These men are probably a class who refused to renounce allegiance to the royalist regime. Klieff advises state that the clergy there has formally recognized the new government.

Tornado Visits Arkansas.
LITTLE ROCK, March 21.—Seven persons were killed and eight injured in a tornado near Belmark this morning. Practically every building in the town was demolished.

Offers Czar Job.
NEW YORK, March 21.—Louis Selznick, a movie writer and millionaire, who was formerly a penniless Russian exile, has cabled the deposed czar offering him five thousand dollars weekly salary if he will come to America and appear in a film entitled "Behind the Throne."

Push Military Training.
WASHINGTON, March 21.—Senator Chamberlain declared today that he will confer with the president very soon in regard to an "arsenal military training and other preparedness measures."

More Rumors of Riots.
AMSTERDAM, Holland March 21.—Rumors of serious rioting in Berlin are circulating here this afternoon. It is alleged that the presence of troops is required to subdue the trouble, and that many detachments have been called from the eastern front for the purpose of quelling the disorders.

FLAG RAISING PROGRAM ARRANGED

It was the sense of the committee that organization of county campaigns be left entirely in the hands of the several counties, and that the sole function of the state headquarters is to be the dissemination of such literature, information, advertising and other service as may be required by the county organizations. The state headquarters also will cooperate in securing speakers for local meetings to discuss the bonding bill. There are many excellent speakers in the different counties, who are well versed in the provisions of the bill and discuss same ably, and the services of such will be enlisted to visit neighboring counties, their expenses to be paid from the state campaign fund.
