CIRCUIT COURT DECISIONS RENDERED

Judge Hamilton today handed down several decisions in the circuit court. In the case of Libbie Kay Coshov against the city of Roseburg an order permitting the withdrawal of exhibits was entered. The Kent State Bank, of Michigan, was given an order of default and decree for \$58,841.66 and costs in its suit against W. H. White, et al. The case of J. W. Mason against Wm. Arnold and James Elsbey was dismissed.

It was ordered in the case of Thomas Hodgson and William Hodgson against Jan. Curtin that the defendant be entitled to possession of the property on the payment of \$300. A judgment for \$1122 was given in the case of C. W. McTeynolds against Isaac and Arthur Ford. The case of J. O. Elrod against the Commercial Abstract Company was dismissed.

"Proposal for constructing a portion of the Public Highway near the town of Canyonville, Douglas County, Oregon." No. 3. "Proposal for constructing a portion of the Public Highway near the postoffice of Perdue, Douglas County, Oregon." No. 4. Each separate bid is to be presented under sealed cover, and each bid shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond made payable to Douglas County, or a certified check made payable to the county judge of Douglas County, for an amount equal to at least five per cent of the amount bid, and no bid shall be considered unless such cash, bond or check is enclosed therewith. Such bidder's bond shall be conditioned that if said bid be accepted, the party bidding will duly enter into and execute the contract. Should the successful bidder to whom the contract is awarded fail to execute the said contract within ten days (not including Sunday) from the date of the mailing of the notice from the county court to him, according to the address therewith given, that the contract in ready for signature, such cash, bond or certified check shall be forfeited to Douglas County, and the same shall be the property of the county. All other cash, bonds, and certified checks will be returned to the unsuccessful bidders who submitted the same.

A corporate surety bond will be required for the faithful performance of each separate contract in a sum equal to one-half of the total amount of the bid.
