FORMER RESIDENT ASKS FOR SERVICE

According to word received in this city today Charles W. Clark, formerly of this city, but now conducting a photographic studio in Eugene has telegraphed to Representative W. C. INDUSTRIAL WORKER SPEAKS AT SCHOOL

Dr. Straub, dean of liberal arts at the University of Oregon, spoke before the student body at the high school assembly yesterday. The subject of his speech being "The Great American Question." It was a speech telling the boys and girls not to be too prone to be independent until they have fitted themselves with higher education. Efficiency was emphasized as all essential in this age of "brain and not brawn." Statistics upon education and muscular labor were given and the talk throughout was very convincing and was well received by the students of the high school.

Dr. Straub stated that "any machine that could do the work of a man will set the wages or drive a man out of business." The truth of this statement is only too true, therefore in choosing a life vocation only the man using his brain will have the best chance.

Eugene as a democratic college for the men and women of small means was emphasized and incidents of this nature were told where boys lived on very meagre monthly allowances and how these boys were treated by the college men and women in better circumstances.
