CARNIVAL WILL NOT BE CANCELLED

Committee Makes Statement Saying That Entertainment Will be Given.

STIMULATE BUSINESS

Committee Has Entered Into Binding Contracts Which Must be Met and Would Require Expenditure Large Sum of Money.

The carnival committee, after carefully considering the suggestion that this year's entertainment be called off, have decided it would be a mistake to do so and are going ahead with increased efforts to make it a pronounced success, according to the following statement which was issued today.

"The majority of our people believe the war will not greatly affect local conditions. The troops from Roseburg may be in camp and later may patrol the Mexican border, but it is seemingly beyond possibility that they will be actively engaged in real warfare. Business will not be greatly reduced but even if it should be depressed the committee, several of them merchants, believe there will be all the more reason for stimulating it, and beyond question the carnival is of benefit, directly and indirectly, to business in general.

"The report that Portland has abandoned its rose festival seems unfounded. There, as here, the matter has been considered but no unfavorable action has been taken as there is a strong feeling that regardless of war conditions, the festival will be of help to those remaining at home, representing by far the larger number.

"None of the cities planning entertainments this summer have cancelled them, so far as known, and none of those planning to come to Roseburg have indicated any change of mind.

"The local committee has entered into several binding contracts and is morally bound in others. An abandonment of the carnival would probably mean the payment of almost half of the total expenditure for the three days' entertainment. Another factor is that of the total almost eighty percent is spent locally, putting it into circulation here instead of sending it away. There will be employment for quite a number and rational entertainment for all. The patriotic value will not be overlooked. People will come to town who are not frequent visitors and even if the carnival does nothing more it will cement and solidify our county population. Several local lodges have invited affiliated lodges from outside and are preparing to entertain them, so we are under the obligation of hospitality as well.

"It is believed that the decision of the committee will receive general approval. It is made by men who are merchants as well as patriotic citizens. Some of them have sons who may then be in the service. Others are in the Red Cross society and sheriff's reserves. If, in addition to the demands made upon all good citizens at this time, these gentlemen are willing to 'do their bit' in making this year's carnival a great success, it is their duty to do so.

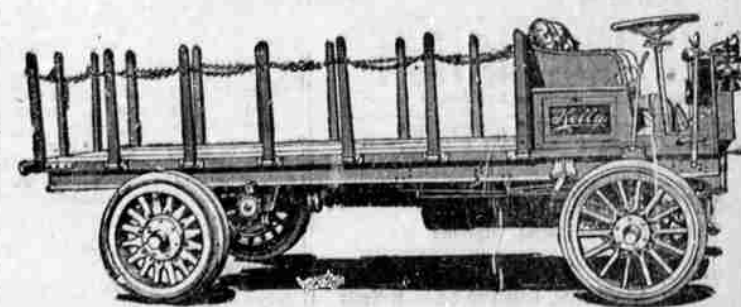
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
