RATHER PESSIMISTIC.

Editor Evening News: Will you kindly give space in your paper to correct a number of misleading statements appearing in an article headed "Grangers Ask For Farming Machinery." First the committee was composed of Messrs. W. C. King, Adams, McCormick and Tjomsland. Second, we asked for pulling and threshing machinery at cost. Third, we did not state that we were putting in large quantities of beans. We mentioned a definite number of acres. We are not afflicted with wind on the brain, neither have we been bitten by the boosting bug.

The part referring to the hitching rack committee is also misleading. Anyone reading it would naturally believe that the time-honored policy of "stalling" the farmer had made another tally. The reporter entirely forgot to mention the instructions given the secretary regarding this matter.

But the biggest, baldest, most misleading distortion of facts is in the part relating to the bond issue. The members of South Deer Creek Grange did not report that they were heartily in favor of the bonds. Mr. Tjomsland and myself stated that we favored the bonds, but that sentiment in our locality was strongly against the bonds. Neither Mr. McCormick nor Mr. Adams mentioned the bonds during the meeting, and to the best of my knowledge are both opposed to the proposed bond issue, both state and county.

In passing I will mention that South Deer Creek Grange at the last regular meeting went on record as opposing the state bond issue.

There seems to be a determined effort in certain quarters to claim favorable sentiment for the proposed bonds regardless of actual facts. Such tactics do no good. They merely lend added color to the statements of opponents of the measure when they claim that it is not being put through on its merits, but is being hurrahed along by a bunch of boosters or worse who have axes to grind.

Personally, I favor the proposed bond issue, but for the love of common sense let it stand or fall on its merits as a plain business proposition. Give us facts, figures, reasons for the distribution of the funds, but spare us any more of the "that little girl's crazy about me" stuff, for take it from one of her brothers, she isn't. Not at present anyway.
