Guardian Appointed.

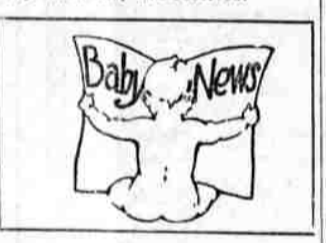
W. F. Thomas has been appointed guardian of the estate of W. D. Moore an insane person. G. W. Young, who was formerly guardian resigned the position a short time.
