ODD FELLOWS WILL MEET TOMORROW

Morning Program Will be Held at the Mew Armory Where Reports Will be Given.

OUT DOOR LUNCHEON

Evening Program Will Consist of Musical Selections by the Orchestra and Will be Held at the Antlers.

Tomorrow will be a gala day for the Odd Fellows of Douglas county and incidentally for Roseburg, for the city is already making ready to welcome the many visitors who will congregate in order to celebrate the anniversary of the founding of the great order. The Douglas county association committees have been working hard for a number of weeks to prepare one of the most extensive programs ever given for a meeting of this organization.

In the forenoon the program will be given at the new armory commencing at 10 a. m., and will consist of speeches by the various prominent officers of the many lodges represented and of musical numbers both vocal and instrumental. The yearly business meeting of the Douglas County Association of Odd Fellows will also be held in the morning at the armory at which time reports of financial conditions and increase in membership will be given as well as the election of officers for the ensuing term.

At noon a basket dinner will be held in the street adjoining the armory if the weather will permit and if not the auditorium will be fitted up as a banquet room. The committee has secured permission from the city council to rope off one block of the street and this will be kept free from travel during the noon hour. The local lodge will serve coffee and cream to the visitors.

In the afternoon the program will be in the I. O. O. F. hall and will be composed chiefly of degree work. At 2 p. m. the Rebekahs will confer their beautiful degree by a team composed of past noble grands and the presiding officers. At 4 p. m. the first degree of Odd Fellowship will be conferred by a team from the two local subordinate lodges.

The evening program will be held at the Antlers theatre and will be composed of musical numbers by the I. O. O. F. orchestra, which is recognized as one of the best in the state and will be interspersed with some special features and a fine moving picture.

COLLEGE BOYS FOUND ON DUTY IN THE RANKS

(By Associated Press.)

CAMBRIDGE, April 24.—Those who return to Cambridge university after the war will find great changes. There is in progress not only a great reform in curriculum, but also a great democratization of the whole university atmosphere. In the past the cost of education at the older English universities has been a bar to all except wealthy and very clever students. Since the war a good deal of attention has been given to the reduction of the expenses of undergraduates and the consequent throwing open of the university to a much wider range of students.

The student after the war will be offered a short course of study and longer terms. This will result in a shortening of the time required for the university course. But generally speaking, it has been found that the heavy cost of a Cambridge education is not due to the fees exacted by the colleges so much as to the extravagant social habits of the undergraduates. Steps are being taken to curb all unnecessary expenditure in this direction, and the student who comes to Cambridge with an idea that he can spend his money freely on all sorts of pleasures will find himself on bad terms with the university authorities.

There is to be a great liberalization of the courses of study. Courses in modern languages, English, economics and modern science, will be extended enormously. The whole system of examinations will be revised, and in all probability the present special examinations will be re-arranged and stiffened. Compulsory Greek will be abandoned, and those who consider that military training should form part of a university education are distinctly in the majority in faculty circles.

For the present, college class rooms are almost completely despoiled.
