Home Talent Players Promise a Surprise in Line of Entertainment.

HAWAIIAN MUSIC TOO

Like Players and Other Musicians Are Rehearsing for Big Production at Antlers Soon —Many Acts Booked.

According to word received at The News office today, the "13 class of the Roseburg high school is preparing to present in this city in the near future, a full fledged vaudeville show, containing all the "ear marks" of a professional organization with a good supply of popular music thrown in for good measure.

A number of the famous high school stars are said to have been secured for the occasion and the Antler's theatre leased for the performance. Heretofore the class has usually spent their entire time on a play, with a regular cast, but it was decided this year to depart from this plan and offer the theatregoers of Roseburg something new and unique. Owing to the fact that very few vaudeville troupes visit this city, it was thought best that a real vaudeville show be presented, with a good variety of home talent to enforce the acts.

The Roseburg high school contains a number of excellent ukulele "travellers" and it is very probable that skit will be presented by these famous instrument wielders. As to whether Hawaiian costumes will be worn in this section at the performance cannot be stated at this time, but from what could be gathered by The News reporter, it is very probable that they will.

Several students also possess a rare talent for violin and other instruments of equal tonal qualities and these have been given a prominent place on the program.

The high school "clowns" are arranging to act that will surprise the local people, who have little faith in the home talent productions, and according to their announcement today, have secured a stock of joke books that contain articles that made grandpa laugh.

The information obtained today in regard to the scheme was very scant and the members of the vaudeville troupe stated that they would gladly make a full announcement in the near future.

Rehearsals are being held at the present time in a number of the acts and the show will undoubtedly be presented without a "hitch".

Tilson arrived in the city today from Portland and will remain here for several days introducing his new auto cleaner and finish, and before leaving will appoint a local representative to represent his company. A particular feature that will interest many auto owners is the claim made that the polish will last for many months, requiring no renewal. Mr. Tilson expects to make several demonstrations in this city to prove the merit of his polish before leaving.

Will Exhibit Animals.
A display of wild animals for the carnival is being arranged by W. H. Clark, who will probably open his stand in the vacant building adjoining the express office. He is a trapper and collector of wild animals and has specimens of porcupine, ground hog, opossum, muskrat, badger, mountain beaver, flying squirrel, prairie dog, horned toads. He had considerable difficulty in obtaining the beaver, which, however, he finally captured. All animals are alive and will form a unique, but instructive exhibit.

Choice of Occupations.

Mailing Examination Papers.

The questionnaires for the eighth grade examinations throughout the county were mailed today from the office of County School Superintendent O. C. Brown. It is estimated that a larger number than usual will take the state examinations this spring.

Scarlet Fever in City.

A case of scarlet fever was discovered today by Dr. E. V. Hoover in a family residing on South Jackson street. He immediately quarantined the household and notified the city health officer, and it is not believed that any other exposures have been made. It is claimed that the case originated from an exposure to the disease in one of the rural communities, no quarantine having been established.

Crocodiles Here.

Three large crocodiles are at the present time housed in the Wallis Fargo offices on the depot grounds and will probably be sold at some time in the near future. The animals were refused at the local station by the A. G. Barnes circus and are now left to the disposition of the company. They are attracting a great deal of attention here. One small one is being kept in a cigar box and often makes his escape by gnawing the wood of the box.

Are You Eligible.

Have you a hammer toe? That is what the army and navy recruiting officers want to know, in addition to whether one has a flat foot. For the benefit of those who are not familiar with hammer toes, the doctors give the information that it is a condition wherein the muscles underneath the toe contract, raising the toe so that part of the weight is placed on the end of the toe. A flat foot is where the arches have broken and the under surface of the foot all touches when walking. As marching is part of a soldier's business, hammer toes and flat foot are tabooed.

New Rural Mail Boxes.

This item of information is for the farmer boys. According to instructions from Washington in regard to rural mail boxes, the farmer cannot buy an old style mail box and take it with him to a new location. But he can take his own box with him. That is if a farmer changes his location and happens to need a new mail box, he is obliged to buy one of the new style, according to regulations received from Washington. This new rural mail box must be made of galvanized iron and there is a choice of two styles. One, just for letters and ordinary mail must be just 15 1/2 inches long, 8 1/4 inches wide and 7 1/2 inches high. The other must be 23 1/2 inches long, 11 inches wide and 14 inches high, a size large enough for ordinary parcel post packages.
