WAR IN MEXICO IS PICTURESQUE

JUAKEZ, Mex., May 15.—Going to war in Mexico is picturesque. Women and children are taken on board the troop trains with their baskets of food, the pots, pans and bottles which make up the furnishings of a poor Mexican's home, the women often taking bird cages, dogs and even goats with them on these troop trains.

When General Murgula's trains arrived in Juarez recently in pursuit of Villa forces, many tourists came from El Paso to witness the picturesque spectacle presented by the army of the north in its typical field equipment. The soldiers wear the distinctive skull and cross bones of General Murgula's "Brigada de Muertos"—Death Brigade—on their campaign hats, the Yaqui Indians wearing, in addition, a crimson band on their hats as their regimental insignia. These soldiers were covered with the white dust of the desert campaign, their khaki uniforms were soiled with much carolys eating and their sandals tied to their brown toes with straps.

The women are even more picturesque. They wear the bright colored calico dresses of the Mexican Indians, carry babies in their arms and often bear the entire burden of the soldier's camp equipment on their backs. Little girls pat the flour and water tortilla cakes in their little brown hands while babies sleep in the shade of a blanket stretched over the roof of the troop train cars. Bundles of firewood hang from the sides of the cars, quarters of beef swing from the beams of the box cars as the trains roll along while the lean, bruised cavalry horses stand patiently in the stock cars.

When leaving a town the Mexican de facto soldiers fire their rifles in the air, cheer for Carranza and their commanders and the train disappears in a cloud of alkali dust, often pursued by soldiers who have tarried too long in a nearby cantina or saloon and missed the train.

ELLA FLAGG YOUNG TQ SPEAK IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, formerly superintendent of Chicago's public schools, and former president of the National Education Association, will speak at the 1917 convention of the National Educational Association to be held here July 7-14. Mrs. Young was president of the association in 1910 and 1911.

Efforts are being made by association officials to have one or more cabinet members address the convention. Three northwest governors, James Withycombe, of Oregon; Ernest Lister, of Washington, and Moses Alexander, of Idaho, are on the program for addresses. Two other speakers will be Mrs. Mary C. Bradford, superintendent of public instruction of Colorado and Bishop W. T. Sumner, of the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon.

The program of the convention will be centered around ideas of preparedness, nationalism and patriotism, according to D. W. Springer, Ann Arbor, Mich. secretary of the association.

OFFERS STATE FAIR FOOD TRAINING CAMP

SALEM, May 16.—With the view of aiding the government in its campaign to increase crop production and reduce the enormous food waste, A. H. Lea, secretary of the state fair board, today wrote Secretary of Agriculture D. F. Houston offering the services of the state fair as a "food training camp." The government, it is believed, will co-operate in the movement by furnishing lecturers, demonstrations and exhibits.
