FIRE BOYS FURNISH THRILLS FOR CROWD

As a closing feature to the Saturday afternoon program of the Roseburg carnival, the members of the Roseburg fire department appeared on the streets at about 5 p. m., togged in their waterproof outfits preparatory to engaging in a water fight and other contests equally interesting. These boys deserve a great deal of credit for staging these events for they were done without the slightest compensation, no prizes being awarded for their efforts. Without a doubt their stunts were the hit of the entire carnival and they received a great deal of applause after each event. The judges chosen to watch over the events were Harry Gall, H. E. Burchfield and Chas. Parrott. The timekeeper was D. B. Bubar.

Remarkable time was made in this contest, Island Brown completing the task in 10 seconds, Garry Rapp 15 4-5 seconds, and James Fletcher 26 4-5 seconds. This time was made entering with the water, but the following time was made advancing toward the box facing the heavy force of the water, Fletcher 17 1-5 seconds, Rapp 15 4-5 seconds, Brown 21 4-5.

The water fight which was the main event resulted in favor of the team composed of Rapp, Fletcher, Riddle and Taylor. The losers were Brown, Ewart, Stephenson and Hicks. The first team never lost an inch while the other fellows retreated a number of inches as a result of the heavy force of water striking them. At times the stream of water was switched from one side of the street to the other, drenching a large number of the spectators and providing merriment for all.

IMPORTANT FACTS ABOUT WAR CENSUS

The Adjutant General's Office Sends out Letters Giving Form of Proceedings.

JUNE 5TH THE DAY SET

Every Male Resident Must Register and No One Exempt at First—Registration of Absentees Required.

The following important information concerning the War census was received at this office today from the adjutant general's office in Portland:

War Census Day. Tuesday, June 5, as named by President Wilson in his official proclamation.

War Census Day. Every male resident between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive. This includes aliens as well as Americans, Japanese, Chinese, Italians, Germans, English, Americans, and men of any other nationality who are of the designated ages, must register. Aliens will not be drafted for war duty, of course, but a complete record of them is desired.

Who Is Exempt. No male resident between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, is exempt from registering. Those to be exempted from military service will be determined later, but first all must register.

Where to Register. Registration must be made in the home precinct of the man registering. Register at your regular voting place.

Hours for Registration. Booths at regular voting places in each precinct will be open on war census day from 7 o'clock a. m. to 9 o'clock p. m. Don't wait until the last moment. Register early.

Registration of Absentees. If you find you will be unavoidably absent from your home precinct on war census day, you should apply at the earliest possible date to the county clerk of the county in which you may be at the time, whether in Oregon or elsewhere, who will fill out your registration card. He will then give you the card, which you must mail to the registrar of your home precinct, in care of the sheriff of your home county, in time to reach the registrar by war census day. If you live in Portland, or a city of over 30,000 population in another state, mail the card to the registrar in care of the mayor.

But remember, the burden of having your card reach the registrar of your home precinct by war census day is on you.

Registration of the Sick. Men of military age who are too ill to go to the voting booth to register must send a competent person before war census day to the county clerk to explain the circumstances, and secure instructions from the federal regulations which these officials will receive from the government.

Penalties. The penalty for failing to appear to register, or for giving false, misleading or incorrect answers, is imprisonment. There is no alternative of a fine.
