SCHOOL ELECTION TO BE HELD NEXT MONDAY

On Monday, June 18, the legal voters of the district will elect two school directors, in compliance with the recent law of the legislature which requires directors to be elected only for a term of three years. The retiring members of the board are Dr. K. L. Miller and S. L. Dill-

ard, both of whom are candidates for re-election. A. J. Geddes, of the Commercial Abstract Company, is also a candidate for the position. An injunction was recently introduced in Portland to restrain the clerk from calling the election, but it was found that the law was constitutional. An effort has been made to interpret the law so that it would require the dismissal of Director Buchanan, but according to the legal opinion of several who have investigated the measure it does not in the least affect Mr. Buchanan's term, while the law states that the people shall elect two directors.

TWENTY-FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS EACH MINUTE

The Red Cross has entered upon a campaign to raise a war fund of \$100,000,000.

This fund is to be expended by the war council, appointed by President Wilson, and is to be used, first, to aid our army and navy in caring for our own soldiers and sailors, and second, to give, and to give at once, assistance to our allies who have borne the burden of the war for nearly three years.

All of the funds raised for the war fund will be turned over to the war council, unless it should be found necessary for urgent local needs, when 25 per cent of the funds thus raised may be returned to the local chapter, but this will not be found necessary in Douglas county.

In order to raise this vast sum during the week, to be known as "Red Cross Week" June 18-25, twenty four thousand dollars must be secured every minute.

Douglas county's share of this fund is \$7,500.00.
