Many Roseburg Students are Enrolled at Oregon Agricultural College.

HONORS ARE WON

Farmers' Short Course of College is Well Patronized—Several American Specialists Have Been Secured for Winter Session.

Prof. J. B. Horner, of the Oregon Agricultural College, who was in this city today and met a number of prospective students for the next year's course. In an interview with a News representative, he gave the following information:

"Among the students enrolled in the Oregon Agricultural College, from Douglas county, during the school year just ended were Christine Gordon Abbott, Violet Rose Blakey, Cora Alice Campbell, Fannie Marie Campbell, Kathryn Margaret Dittel, Dorothy Evans, Philip Harth, Edith Ireland, Orin Letoy Ireland, Leon E. AT THE MAJESTIC TOMORROW.

CONDITIONS IN OREGON FAVORABLE

(By Associated Press.)

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—Growing grain fields throughout Oregon are in good condition, with the exception of corn, which is growing very slowly, according to the government weather bureau's summary of crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending June 12, 1917, made public today. The statement follows:

"Weather conditions were favorable for the first few days when it turned cooler and frost formed in a few localities, but it did no harm of consequence.

"Winter wheat is now heading in places and its condition is generally good. Spring wheat seeding is practically finished and the crop is in all stages of development; some just coming up and some well stalked and covering the ground nicely. Barley, oats and rye are making good progress, but corn is growing very slowly.

"Sugar beets and hops are in excellent condition. Hops are being cultivated and sugar beets are being thinned. Potatoes, truck crops and gardens are backward, but otherwise they are growing nicely.

"Cut worms are bothersome in a few places, but not so much as in other years.

"Meadows, pastures and ranges are in excellent condition. Haying has begun and the first crop of alfalfa is turning out satisfactorily.

"Fruit of all kinds is promising."

WILL PLACE LARGE DAM AT HATCHERY

Specifications for a dam 290 feet in length and 18 feet in height were being prepared today by Engineer L. G. Hicks, who, accompanied by Forest Supervisor S. C. Bartrum and Deputy Game Warden Orin Thompson, made a survey at the fish hatchery yesterday. The dam, if approved by the state engineer, will be installed at the hatchery to take the place of the more expensive racks which are under the present arrangement put in each spring and taken out in the fall.

The dam will probably be constructed entirely of concrete and will serve to form a large basin behind it. A survey was also made of the grounds in order that more buildings or other apparatus may be constructed.
