MANY SLACKERS IN RED CROSS DRIVE

Men of Wealth Fail to Contribute to Cause While Poor are More Patriotic.

WINCHESTER GENEROUS

Little Town Responds With Large Contributions to the Appeal of the Red Cross Committees Heading the Campaign.

The Red Cross teams bring in good reports from the canvass for funds thus far, in some instances meeting with much better results than anticipated, but over against these good reports they also are compelled to report certain selfish individuals, who lack the needful spirit of patriotism, or are so inhuman that they care not what becomes of the soldier and sailor boys, who go out from our homes, fight for our country in this, her hour of peril, and Douglas county will be compelled to send to Washington a list of "slackers," and most of the names handed in thus far, are men of wealth, so that they would be making no sacrifice, even should they subscribe hundreds of dollars each. This call for funds to the Red Cross war fund does not come from the men who are in the field fighting for your little contribution, nor from the state headquarters at Portland, neither does it come from national headquarters at Washington, D. C., but the call comes from President Wilson, commander in chief of the army of the United States, so when you return to assist in this great cause you are refusing the president. But this is not all, you are deliberately saying to the mothers of Roseburg and Douglas county, "Send your boys, for whom you have suffered and sacrificed. Let them go to the trenches of France and fight for me, and for the security of my property interests, and for the continuation of American liberty. They may be wounded in battle, and lie on the battle fields until death shall come to relieve the pain, but I will not give one cent to help the Red Cross care for them, for I believe in keeping the money at home."

You say there are no such selfish people in this county. Well, ask the captains and lieutenants of the several teams, and they can tell you things that will make your blood boil. What do you think of a man worth possibly \$50,000 offering \$1.00 to the committee, and of a man who hopes the war will continue so that the price of wheat will go still higher, providing the country does not have to enter the war?

Just to show that the true spirit of American patriotism is not confined to the larger cities and towns, the little city of Winchester set an example in liberal giving, by subscribing \$200 to the Red Cross war fund yesterday. These people not only gave liberally, but willingly and gladly, and counted it a privilege to be able to do their part in the interest of suffering and dying soldier boys, who will fight our battles for us. A prediction that no other locality of a like population in the state of Oregon will do more than Winchester has, and they need to be commended and congratulated. Lieutenant Burchfield had promised to hold a rally at Winchester this evening, but on account of his team being obliged to visit Canas Valley and other outlying districts today and tomorrow, this meeting had to be cancelled. If every part of Douglas county will respond as Winchester has, Douglas county will be able to report double our apportionment.

MOTOR CARS NEEDED TO CARRY TROOPERS
Rapid Time Made Where Automobiles Are Available.

When it comes to matters military, little Visalia, Cal., is not only patriotic but strictly modern. A short time ago the recruiting officers in that town were informed that a machine gun company was needed in a hurry by the Second California Infantry.

A rapid-fire recruiting campaign produced the men in 24 hours and then a dozen business men of Visalia, who own Dodge Brothers motor cars, offered to let the new recruits at the Presidio at San Francisco in record time.

This was the first attempt at moving troops long distances by motor in the San Joaquin Valley and it was watched with much interest by military men.

The 230-mile run was made in eight and one-half hours, with an average speed of 27 miles an hour. The first half of the trip was complete with a 35-mile average, but rain and slippery roads cut the average to 27 before the ferry at Oakland was reached.

While the number of men moved in this particular instance was small, the run demonstrated that the number of troops it would be possible to rush to a given point would depend wholly on the number of motor cars available.

The only delay reported on the entire trip was occasioned by five punctures. The performance of the Dodge Brothers cars aroused high praise from the officers who accompanied the recruits on the trip.

They will be subject at any time to call to military duty, but if not actually engaged in guard duty or other detail may be assigned to farm work.
