DRAFTING WILL BE STARTED SOON

Expected That Order to Send Cards to Washington Will Be Received.

WILL DRAW BY LOTS

Jury Wheel Will Be Installed For Each State and Names of Those Chosen Will Be Wired to the County Where They Live.

It is very probable that within a few days a call will be received here by the county registration board to send the cards obtained in Douglas county at the time the war census was taken June 5, to Washington, D. C., where they will be placed in the hands of the provost marshal.

Plans for the drafting of men of conscriptionable age have been completed, according to information received, and the task of pressing the men into service will begin during the second week in July. It is expected that the men drafted for service will be able to report for actual duty by September 1, or earlier if possible. All cards of those who registered will be numbered prior to being sent to Washington where the drafting will occur. A jury wheel will be installed for each state, and will be operated under the direct supervision of the war department officials. Strict fairness will prevail throughout these operations and every man of conscriptionable age will have an equal opportunity.

In drafting the men the wheels will be turned, and the man whose name appears on the board bearing the number indicated on the dial of the wheel when it stops, will be drawn. This will continue until every state in the union has furnished its full allotment.
The names of the men selected will then be telegraphed to the county in which they are registered, and published in the newspapers. If they claim exemptions for any reason, they will have to appear before the county military board and substantiate their contentions. Men who do not claim exemption will probably be assigned without delay and sent to the various posts for service.
In accordance with the plan adopted by the government, the task of drafting the men will be taken from the county military boards and placed with the military officials.

The regular June examination for state teachers' certificates is being conducted at the Rose school building, by Supt. O. C. Brown, assisted by Supt. F. B. Hamlin.
There were twenty-eight in attendance, at the opening of the examination this morning, some of whom are trying for certificates, while others are writing for exemptions in certain subjects. Mr. Brown expects quite a number more before the close of the examination.

The papers will be sent to the office of the state superintendent to be graded, and it will probably be about three weeks before the result will be announced.
