COUNTY COURT NOTIFIED ERECT CROSSING SIGNS

The Douglas county court today received a letter from the public service commission at Salem relative to the erection of railroad crossing signs. The following is the letter of instruction:

"Please be advised that chapter 429 of the Laws of Oregon for 1917, which became effective on May 21, 1917, provides that every city, town or county shall within six months from the passage of the act, place and thereafter maintain, warning signs on every street and highway where the same crosses a railroad at grade, which signs shall be placed in a conspicuous location beside the highway 300 feet from the nearest rail of such crossing, unless otherwise ordered by the public service commission of Oregon. Such sign shall consist of a metal disk 24 inches in diameter, with a white field and a black border line one inch wide, with a black perpendicular and horizontal cross line two and one-half inches wide; the reverse side of such disk colored black. In each of the upper quarters shall appear the black letter 'R' five inches high, three and three-quarters inches wide, lines one inch stroke. The act also provides that if, in the case of any such crossing, it appears to the public service commission that the placing of these signs is impracticable or unnecessary, the commission may on petition of the city, town or county in which said crossing is situated, release such city, town or county from the obligation of placing and maintaining such signs on the streets or highways near such crossings. A penalty is also prescribed for failure on the part of the municipality to comply with this law within the prescribed time."

GENERAL PERSHING ALLOWED WAR RATIONS

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, July 12.—Major General Pershing, commander of the American expeditionary force in France, seated for tea on the beautiful Thames Terrace of the house of commons with Colonel Astor as his host, had an experience in England's war rationing when he found that he could not have sugar in his tea and on his strawberries as well.

"You may have only one portion of sugar, two-revenths of an ounce," the waitress informed him with a quaint air of precision, and the general promptly chose sugarless strawberries, remarking that the sun, as though anxious to compensate, had sweetened the strawberries so well that sugar was not essential. In the bounteous times of peace, the house of commons waitresses used to trip about the terrace during the fine June afternoons with big bowls of white powdered sugar and lavish jugs of cream. Now the sugar is strictly rationed, and the amount of cream that may be used is limited to one small measured portion for each person.

COMMISSION VISITS PRESIDENT CARRANZA

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, July 12.—A commission of workmen has visited the capital to talk with President Carranza concerning the alleged activities of the leaders of labor unions in some of the cotton and textile factories of Vera Cruz. It is said they asked that the activities of some of these labor agents be curbed as they have led to disorders and in some cases to the closing down of the factories. The affair was speedily adjusted and the factories have resumed operation.

MILITARY EXPEDITION REACHES DESTINATION

(By Associated Press.) MEXICO CITY, July 12.—The military expedition under General Manuel Perez Trevino sent to capture the island of Guadalupe in the Pacific, has reached its destination. The garrison will prevent invasions by so-called pirates who have been looting the pearl shell beds of the island and will also aid in colonizing the island.
