CAN BE EXAMINED AWAY FROM HOME

A question frequently asked in connection with the coming draft is whether a man absent from his home county, either out of the state or in another county of the state, can arrange to have the expense of returning to his home county for physical examination, etc., if he is called by appearing before the exemption board of the county in which he happens to be.

He can, but only under the following conditions:

Immediately after receiving notification from his home county board to appear for physical examination, the absentee should write the board, fully explaining the circumstances and asking permission to present himself before the board in the county where he is situated.

The war department draft regulations authorize his home board, if it is satisfied with his statement, to give such permission. He should not appear before the other board, however, until he has first been notified by his home board and has obtained the necessary permission.

The board before which he appears will have full jurisdiction over his case.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ROSEBURG CAMPERS

Umpqua National Forest is an Ideal Place to Spend Summer Vacation.

MANY POINTS INTEREST

Roseburg is the Railroad and Outfitting Point for These Camping Spots and Effort Should Be Made to Make This Center.

Residents of Roseburg, who are this summer planning on taking camping trips and wish to get the pleasures of hunting, fishing and other outdoor recreation that truly become an ideal camping ground will find all of these things in generous measure in the Umpqua national forest and the privately owned forests of Douglas county. In these forests you may seek pleasure and health in your own way. You may camp where you like and stay as long as you please and in the Umpqua national forest you will find no signs except those pointing the way and inviting your co-operation in preserving the beauty and usefulness of the mighty forest. The streams and lakes are well stocked with trout and salmon and other fresh water fish, hunting grounds where all kinds of game are protected and pleasant and healthful camping grounds often amid surroundings of rare scenic beauty, which are all open to the visitor.

For those who are desirous of knowing more about the Umpqua national forest as a camping ground the following information has been compiled and The News is glad to furnish it to the readers, even though no thought of a camping trip is in your mind, for the knowledge of this famous forest reserve is worth knowing.

The Umpqua national forest extends from the Calapooya mountains on the north to the Umpqua-Rogue river divide on the south. It has an area of 1,619,667 acres. It includes the upper basin of the Umpqua system and reaches eastward as far as the summit of the Cascade range. There are four townships on the north which are the water shed of the Willamette.

Two streams cross the forest, the North and South Umpqua rivers. These and their tributaries have cut a labyrinth of steep, dark canyons in the long western slope of the Cascades. Between the canyons are narrow, irregular ridges. At the headwaters of the North Umpqua, however, the valleys have been glaciated and later filled in with pumice deposits.

Game is abundant throughout the forest, but particularly so in the South Umpqua region. There is good fishing everywhere in the North Umpqua and its tributaries below the Tokatee Falls, about 75 miles east of Roseburg. Fish Creek is the last and best of all these streams. Tokatee Falls are too high for fish to get above them; but Diamond lake has recently been stocked and the upper streams will eventually be supplied from there. Most of the tributaries of the South Umpqua are fairly well stocked with fish. Little Fish lake, near the head of the river, is exceptionally good. The South Umpqua is not itself a particularly good fishing stream. Camp equipment, supplies and guides can usually be supplied at Tiller.

Suitable camp sites are abundant in the interior of the forest, so much so that no special localities need be mentioned. Forage is scarce at lower elevations but there is plenty of feed, fuel and water. The camper can reach the edge of this region by a day's travel over any route from Settlement. It takes two or three days to get to most of the popular places.

The following are the points of special interest on the North Umpqua: Caps Illahee, formerly famous as an Indian rendezvous and race track; Soda Springs, on the river 6 miles above Illahee; Tokatee Falls and gorge reached by trail from Big Camas via the Fish Creek Desert Junction; Watson Falls, where the waters of Watson Creek drop over a 300 foot cliff; the Hot Mineral Springs on the North Umpqua above Mountain Meadows; Lemolo Falls, a few miles below Kelsay Valley; Spring river, which comes to the surface a full grown river and is a short tributary of the Umpqua; several small but beautiful falls in the Clearwater river, good view of nearly the whole Umpqua national forest may be obtained from the forest service lookout station; Mount Theelson, 9,175 feet high, the highest peak in the forest; Black Rock and Diamond lake may be reached also by way of the South Umpqua.

The South Umpqua is the place to go for hunting and the North Umpqua for an all-round vacation. To think of all of the scenic and camping advantages offered in the foregoing paragraphs and to take in consideration the Roseburg is the most important railroad and outfitting point for these places, should bring the residents of this beautiful city to a realization of a future that could be gained for this community. There is no reason why Roseburg should not take advantage of this opportunity and do a little advertising in an attempt to make this a tourist center. "A word to the wise"—and a little boasting will do the business.
