RIGID TRAINING IN OFFICERS CAMP

Men With Commissions Required to Work at Trench Digging and Equipping.

L.W. HUMPHREYS WRITES

Letter States Men Must Make Good or Be Dismissed from Service—Are in Ignorance as to Where They Go.

T. N. Humphreys, of Myrtle Creek, has received a letter from his son, Lester, who has a first lieutenant's commission and is located at the officers' training camp at the Presidio. The letter contained pictures of the men's quarters, which are very comfortable looking indeed, and of dummies, which are used in bayonet practice, and it also described the training the officers are receiving. The dummies, which are about the size of a man, are of two kinds, stationary ones and the swinging kind, which are operated by means of pulleys and ropes, the object being in practice with either to run the bayonet through the ring serving as target on the dummy.

The officers are being rigidly drilled in field training and trench warfare, being required to do actual digging in the trench work, the object being an exact reproduction of a section of trench, now being used in France, and will include the firing trench, communicating trench, rooms to rest and sleep in, dumps or store rooms for ammunition and supplies and cover trenches to be used during artillery bombardment. Although the men in training have received their officers' commissions, they are being given a very rigid competitive test, including such work as has been described above and those who fail to make good will be sent home. While rumors are constantly afloat as to what will be done with the men, when the training is over, next month, Mr. Humphreys says they are in absolute ignorance as to where they will be sent.

It will be remembered that he was favored for appointment as minister to Siam, but turned down the position to enlist in the service of Uncle Sam this being the second time, he having served three years in the Philippine Islands.

A DRUNKEN RIDE IN A FORD MACHINE

EUGENE WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE

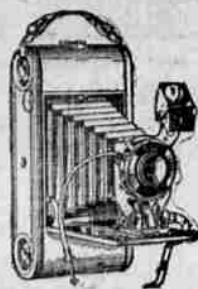

ONE HUNDRED PICKERS ARE WANTED AT ONCE

A. T. Lawrence, manager of the Sunshine ranch this morning telephoned The News office stating that it is imperative that 100 loganberry pickers present themselves Monday at his ranch east of the city in order that this year's crop will not be a total loss. He stated that at the present time over one half of the crop would spoil on the bushes and he is putting forth an extra effort to secure a large number of pickers for next week. The help shortage has been the greatest trouble in harvesting the loganberry crop and although during the past few days, a great deal of additional labor has been secured it was not sufficient to save the

berries from spoiling.
The drying is now in progress and the berries are not picked fast enough to keep the dryer going. Mr. Lawrence is paying the pickers two cents per pound which is double the wages paid in the Willamette valley for like work.
If this section wishes to have a future crop, such as loganberries, labor must be secured, so that the growers will not lose money. The Sunshine ranch offers excellent camping advantages to anyone who wishes to take their family there and engage in the work of picking the berries and the excellent wages paid should make the proposition an attractive one.
If you know of anyone wishing work tell them of this opening and make an effort to assist Mr. Lawrence so that this crop will not be abandoned in years to come.
The berries of this year are of an excellent quality and if pickers can be secured, the management of the ranch can find a ready market.
