LETTER RECEIVED FROM MR. BROWN

Attorney-General Writes 'Concerning Taxation on O. & C. Grant Lands

TAXES SHOULD BE PAID

Will Aid In Every Possible Way t Have Lands Placed Upon the Market at Once-Meet-

ing Tuesday.

Attorney General George M. Browns called a meeting of the districttorneys of the state at Salem nex uesday at which time the matte ruesday at which time the matter will be determined whether the state shall collect the taxes due from the government and ther make a separate fight for the inter-est due, the government having re-cently ruled that it owed the state taxes on the land, but not interes

L. S. Shipley who has been tak-ing a decided interest in the matter recently wrote Mr. Brown concern-ing the O. & C. land grant and today received the following letter:

Acknowledging receipt of yours of the 1st instant, this is to say that it has been our purpose ever since the taking over of the Oregon & Callformin Railroad Company land by the government, to aid in every pos-sible way in the matter of having the lands placed upon the market in order that they may be disposed of and again placed upon the tax rolls of the several counties when

I was very glad to hear from you concerning the matter of taxation When I first took up the matter when I has took up the matter of the taxation and collection of the same, upon these lands, it was generally understood by every one that we could collect on the valua-tion of the railroad company's interest in the land; that is to say, that they could only be taxed upon the assessed valuation of \$2.50 per acre-i insisted that we could collect upon the valuation made by the inwful asseasing officers, which claim was fin ally recognized by congress, and the

slly recognized by congress, and the Chamberlain-Ferris bill provided for the payment of taxes, assessed against the lands to the railroad company. The Chamberlain-Ferris act provided for the taxes accrued and remaining unpaid. There had been a difference of opinion as to whether or not this meant taxes recrued, including penalties and interest, or otherwise.

he assistant attorney general, F. J. Searful, advised the interior depart-tion that the Chamberlain-Ferria III provided for the payment of taxes without penalty and Interest.

I have malted copies of this opin-ion to all district attorneys of the state of the various counties where the land grant is situated.

Since the supreme court of the United States has upheld the Chamberlain-Ferris (iii), there is no reason in the world why the taxes should not be paid, and paid now, provided the countles are willing to accept the taxes without penalties and interest.
