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WAR HAS OPENED EYES OF EUROPE

German Socialists Are Beginning to Awake From the False Dream

BUT NO PEACE IN SIGHT

Is Declared at This Time Terms Would All Be in Germany's Favor—Social Question Serious Problem.

GENEVA, July 28.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—"The Hohenzollerns and the Hapsburgs must go in order to have a durable peace in Europe," declared Jean Sigg, member of the Swiss national council, chief of the socialist in Geneva and one of the most influential members of his party in Switzerland, in an interview with the Associated Press correspondent.

"The hour of the Hohenzollerns and the Hapsburgs has sounded," he continued. "The tide of democracy which is sweeping across Europe will also sweep them away, not perhaps during the war, but soon afterward. Millions of men will not agree, will not allow in future, that their destinies, their lives, should be ruled by a handful of autocrats. In this sense this terrible war has wrought good; it has opened the eyes of the people. The Russian emperor has gone, more emperors will follow."

Mr. Sigg has the greatest faith in new Russia, if allowed to rebuild its own regeneration without foreign, especially German influence. He considers the Stockholm conference more or less a farce owing to the divergent views of the socialist delegates from the different countries. He flouts the work at Petrograd of Robert Grimm, the Swiss socialist who endeavored to make peace between Germany and Russia, who, he says, never represented Swiss socialism and who acted like Hoffman on his own authority without consulting his colleagues.

"German socialists, with few exceptions," said Mr. Sigg, have betrayed international socialism by following like a flock of sheep in

the footsteps of German Junkerism, but they are now beginning to awake from their false dream.

"Though, like all Swiss, I ardently wish for peace, I don't see it in sight. A peace treaty now—I see this as a neutral—would be all in the favor of Germany a status quo ante. The allies, backed now by America, rightly will not permit this in the cause of justice and humanity. The social questions after the war will be difficult to solve—but wait first until the war is finished."

MRS. HOWARD H. LEEP DOES NOT FIND SPOUSE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—Mrs. Howard H. LEEP has returned from New Orleans, where she went last week after receiving two telegrams signed "E. A. Young, Lieut. U. S. A.," the first saying that her husband was killed in an airplane accident and asking how to dispose of his remains, and the second that LEEP had been partially revived by a pulmotor and was calling for his wife and mother. Similar telegrams were sent to Dr. LEEP, at Myrtle Point, Ore., who, with his wife went to New Orleans, meeting the daughter-in-law. All are mystified as they can find no trace of Airman LEEP, no airplane accident and no army officer named Young.

The investigation has satisfied them that LEEP himself sent the telegrams. Mrs. LEEP has asked the war department to investigate. LEEP was wearing a signal corps officer's uniform and claimed he had been commissioned an officer in the aviation section. He left Washington two weeks ago for Leon Springs, Texas.

WOULD CHANGE ROAD EUGENE TO ROSEBURG

Levi Geer, owner of the London Springs health resort, and Emerson Keithly of that place, were in Eugene Thursday afternoon, interviewing county officials in an attempt to have the Pacific highway go through their place instead of by way of Divide. They claim that a much better road can thus be constructed than according to the route heretofore planned.

When seen Friday concerning the matter County Judge H. L. Brown stated that so far as he was concerned he considered it a matter of the state highway commission to decide. If the change were advisable it should be made before the road by way of Divide is improved. Judge Brown stated that his understanding of the matter is that it has been presented to the state highway commission and they have not seemed to take interest in the project as feasible.

County Surveyor H. W. Libby stated that he knew nothing of the matter from personal observation, but the statement that the pass is lower than the present road to Roseburg is incorrect unless some point on the highway between Divide and Roseburg is much higher than Divide. Mr. Libby showed a profile of the proposed route made by Harvey Taylor of Cottage Grove, shows a maximum elevation of approximately 1800 feet, while the elevation at Divide, according to Mr. Libby is but 700 feet.—Eugene Guard.

COOS BAY MAY GET COLONY BELGIANS

That Coos Bay is to have a colony of Belgians is a practical certainty according to the statement of James Slevin, director of the organization which is backing the colonization, who has spent the past two days in conference with prominent local men, says the Coos Bay Times.

How much land will be taken and where this will be is not yet definitely known. Negotiations are under way and will probably be completed in the next few days.

About 500 colonists will be brought here in December if the deal is completed. This is about 100 families, each of which will take an area of from 25 to 40 acres, under the conditions announced. 28 years in which payment is made for the land.

SPIES ARE ACTIVE IN UNITED STATES

CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—Herbert Corey, in a special cable from Madrid to the Daily News, says, in part that "Germany's principal means of wireless communication with the United States is through Madrid. There can be no doubt that the army of spies which is active in the United States depends upon the great wireless station 20 kilometers outside of Madrid for the rapid exchange of news

with Berlin.

"This station advertises that it accepts messages for delivery in Germany through the German wireless station at Nauen and messages for Austria-Hungary through the Austrian station at Pola. It is asserted that the communication is very rapid.

"Nor are the rates exorbitant. For 50 centimes—the equivalent of 10 cents—10-word messages are sent to Berlin, while Budapest messages cost only 55 centimes a word. No one of the 80,000 Germans more or less actively engaged in espionage in the United States would complain at paying these prices.

"So far as is known here, the plan of the German spies in the United States is to send messages either directly to Spain by way of the constant steamer mails from New York, Cuba or Mexican ports, or to relay them through the wireless on the Canary Islands."
