AND STILL THEY COME SAYS SUPT. BROWN

Superintendent O. C. Brown has hoisted the white flag and has "hollered" enough, for since The News a short time ago published his statement regarding the shortage of teachers in Douglas county, the superintendent's office has been swamped with letters, both ordinary and special delivery, night letters and telegrams until fully two hundred have been received "and still they come," says Mr. Brown. He states that while many good teachers have written regarding schools, the article has resulted in "uncharitable" number of "letters," for instance one teacher in Minnesota who has not

taught since 1909, asked if a permit would be granted on a certificate of that date.

Superintendent Brown has always made it a practice to see that his own teachers had secured positions before giving much encouragement to those teachers from afar, but this year there was a shortage of local material.

The superintendent says, "I have heard from the west and middle west and expect soon to hear from the eastern states."

FRANCE NOT WILLING TO DISCUSS POLICIES

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Sealed proposals addressed to the county court of Douglas county, Oregon, and endorsed "Proposals for constructing pavement between the West City limits of the city of Roseburg, Oregon and the Oregon State Soldiers' Home" will be received by the county court of Douglas county at its office in the court house, Roseburg, Oregon, until three o'clock P. M. of the 29th day of September, 1917, and at that time and place will be publicly opened and read.

All proposals must be made upon blank forms to be obtained from the county clerk at his office, Roseburg, Oregon, must give the prices proposed both in writing and figures, and must be signed by the bidder, with his address.

Each bid is to be presented under sealed cover and shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond made payable to Douglas County, or a certified check made payable to the county clerk of Douglas County, for an amount equal to at least five per cent of the amount bid, and no bid shall be considered unless such cash, bond, or check is enclosed therewith. Such bidder's bond shall be conditioned that if said bid be accepted the party bidding will duly enter into and execute the contract. Should the successful bidder fail to execute the same within ten days (not including Sundays) from the date of notification of such award, all cash, bond, or check shall be forfeited to Douglas county and the same shall be the property of the county. All other cash, bonds and certified checks will be returned to the successful bidder who submitted the same.

A corporate surety bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in a sum equal to one half (1/2) of the total amount of the bid.

All bids are to be prepared on the basis of the county engineer's estimate of the quantities of work to be done.

Plans may be seen and forms of specifications and contract may be obtained at the office of the county clerk, Roseburg, Oregon.
