## SNAPPY LOCALS OF ROSEBURG SOLDIERS

Legn McClintock and Clarence Tester, both members of the Sanitary troops located at Fort Canby, "somewhere in Washington," are scheduled to arrive in Roseburg next week for a short visit with friends and relatives here. Other members of that organization located at Fort Columbia and Stevens are also planning to take a trip here at that time and the city will undoubtedly be crowded with the "home boys," if they are successful in securing their leave of absence.

Clifford Lilly, of Glide, who is connected with the hospital corps at Fort Stevens, has had a very tedious job during the past two weeks. His duties were to take care of a case of spinal meningitis that has been placed in quarantine there. Cliff volunteered for the position and according to reports reaching here, has been a very successful nurse. Every precaution has been taken by the physician there to see that he does not contract the disease.

The Fourth company boys are all "hitting heavy," and at the present time are plunged into their work with a great deal of vim and vigor. Delwin Jewett is still at the post of keeping the boys in good spirits and every evening his "circus voice" can be heard ringing loudly all over the camp. There is a rumor to the effect that several evenings ago, residents of Hammond, a town near Fort Stevens sit on the front porch in the evening and listen to him talk. Hammond is about a mile and one-half from the fort.

Nearly every boy from Douglas county located at the forts at the mouth of the Columbia is gaining in weight, which is strong evidence that the food they receive is sufficient and of good quality. The Fourth company lads have been having regular banquets lately with the food sent from Roseburg and they state that nothing could be more appreciated.

According to word received in this city today from Earl Vanbibber, bugler with the Fourth company, two hours extra drill per day is now being held which points strongly to an early move. There has been some talk of a move to North Carolina, but nothing definite has been learned in regard to this. It is only reasonable, however, that the forts at the Columbia mouth will be no good this winter as training places on account of the rainy season. It is very probable that some of the coast artillery companies will be changed to heavy artillery and moved to some camp in the north where they can receive better training.

Bertell Ford, a Riddle boy and Roy Cedernstrom, of Melrose, both members of the Sanitary troops who were transferred to Ft. Columbia several weeks ago, state that they like their new post fine and are receiving the best of treatment there. They are under the command of Lieut. Mott, and he has been devoting a great deal of time lately instructing them in bandaging and acts of first aid. The two boys will probably visit in this city next week.

By the time the last typhoid injection is given the boys, their arms will resemble a sieve or a sponge, being so full of the holes from the hypodermic needle. It is very peculiar the way the "shots" affect the different lads, and some of them are knocked completely out by it, while others only suffer a sore arm. While standing at attention on the parade grounds at Canby several days ago, several lads "kicked" over and the Sanitary troops were forced to resort to the ammonia bottle in order to revive them.

Bill Trumbull, a member of the Fourth company, who was recently promoted to sergeant, is handling his new duties in a very efficient manner and the other lads who were also advanced in rank are doing likewise. They will undoubtedly make their mark in the present war and in case a transfer "across the waves" is made they will stand a good show of receiving a commission.
