TROOP TRAINS RESUMED OCT. 4

Roseburg Feed 8027 Men—Kruger and Wick to be in Charge Movement.

CHECK HERE FOR MEALS

Arrangements Similar to Those of Last Week for This Movement
Chief Clerk to Assist
Kruger and Wick.

In a communication received in this city yesterday from General Passenger Agent John M. Scott it is stated that Alvin D. Wick and A. E. Kruger who were supervisors of the troop movement last week in this city have been assigned to this station for the next movement which will occur beginning Saturday of the present week. This information is very gratifying to the local people who were well satisfied with the successful work performed by Mr. Kruger and Mr. Wick during their stay here. John M. Scott personally supervised the Oregon traffic from Ashland last week and had intended to make Roseburg his headquarters for the coming movement because of its central position and better facilities for handling the men, but urgent business calls him to San Francisco and he will be represented by Chief Clerk Ormandy. Mr. Ormandy is well known and highly regarded in Roseburg, having visited here on numerous occasions.

The first voucher for meals served in Roseburg was received by Miss Agnes Pitchford, secretary of the Red Cross chapter yesterday and represents \$3147.60, covering 5246 meals. Ten cents of the 60 cents received for the individual meal goes to the credit of the local chapter of the Red Cross and the remainder is distributed among the various restaurants, according to the number of men fed by each on the various trains.

The official advices of troop movements have not yet been received although it was reported that the start would be on the 3rd and 5th, meaning the arrival here on the 4th and 6th. In order that preparations could be made in due time a wire was sent this afternoon to the general offices in San Francisco and the following schedule was received by wire immediately: Troop movements resumed Thursday, October 4, with 491 men for luncheon at 1:00 p. m. Total of 16 troop trains this week ending at noon of the 9th; 8027 men to be fed, 1300 more than before. Three breakfasts Saturday Sunday and Tuesday. Schedule:

- October 4—1 p. m., 7:30 p. m., 8:45 p. m., 1532 men.
- October 5—12:30 p. m., 8:40 p. m., 1005 men.
- October 6—8 a. m., 7 p. m., 8 p. m., 1546 men.
- October 7—7:30 a. m., 1:30 p. m., 7 p. m., 8 p. m., 190 men.
- October 8—1:30 p. m., 8:15 p. m., 1067 men.
- October 9—7:30 a. m., 12:30 p. m., 976 men.

The arrangements for the serving of the men are similar to those of the last time and preparations were begun immediately upon receipt of the wire. For the information of the public the quartermaster will later publish the territory represented by each train.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—Shaken, but still powerful, is the estimate of Germany's strength on the western front, given in this week's issue of the official communique, used by the war department. It is said that the British superiority over the Germans is conclusively proven by the fighting last week which also demonstrated that the Teuton fighting stamina is at a low ebb. The communique says nothing of the activities of the United States forces in Europe.
