FORMALDEHYDE FOR PREVENTING SMUT

Method of Treating Seed Grain Before The Sowing is Given.

CLEAN THE GRAIN WELL

Agricultural Experts at O. A. C. Suggest Ways Of Preparing Seed Which They Believe To Be the Best.

Out of ten samples of wheat that have been brought to the office in the last month five have contained smut balls. This would indicate that smut is quite prevalent in the county, and even when there are no smut balls present it is not to be assumed that the seed is free from infection as the spores are microscopic, and cannot be seen with the naked eye. All wheat, oats and barley should be treated before sowing. The following are the best methods of treating as recommended by Prof. Barsz, of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Formaldehyde Treating Solution.
Formaldehyde (formalin) full strength (about 37 per cent) 1 pint water, 40 gallons.

Tank or Barrel Treatment.
Run grain through fanning mill to remove smut balls, shrunken grain, etc. Partly fill tank or barrel with solution and put in grain.

For Wheat.
If the seed is not known to be perfectly free from smut balls pour the wheat in loose, stir with hoe or some other implement to bring the smut balls to the surface, skim off. If the seed is known to be perfectly free from smut balls it may be treated in partially filled sacks; soak for 30 minutes, remove, drain and plant the same day, or wash with pure water and spread out to dry.

For Oats.
Put oats in gunny sack and soak for 20 minutes in the solution. Take out, drain and plant at once. If grain is to be kept for a later date, wash with pure water and dry thoroughly.

For Barley.
Barley is more sensitive to the action of formaldehyde than wheat or oats. Use same method as for oats but use the weaker solution, 1 pint of formaldehyde to 40 or 50 gallons of water, and soak for ten minutes only. It should then be washed with pure water, drained, and if it is not needed shortly should be thoroughly dried.

Sprinkling Method.
Run grain through the fanning mill. Spread grain out on clean floor or tarpaulin a few inches thick. Sprinkle with the 1 pint to 40 gallon solution of formaldehyde. Shovel or hoe the grain over until every kernel is wet, then shovel up into a pile and cover with sacks or tarpaulin previously moistened with the solution. Leave for 2 hours or more. Uncover. Spread out until dry enough to run through drill, and plant at once, or if grain is not to be seeded immediately dry thoroughly before storing away.

The sprinkling method should not be used for wheat if it has not been cleaned of smut balls, as this method does not kill the spores contained in unbroken balls and when run through the drill the smut balls are broken and the living smut spores are then sown on the seed. Such grain should therefore be treated loose in the open tank and smut balls allowed to float on the top of the solution where they can be removed by skimming.

Caution.
Do not soak seed longer than recommended. Spread out to dry at once, and never allow treated grain to stand away in sacks any length of time with the grain wet or moistened.

In some cases of using formaldehyde method of treatment considerable loss in germination of seed or failure to make a good stand of grain is very often reported. Therefore it would be well after treating grain, if possible, to make a germination test to see just what proportion of grain will germinate and then make your seeding accordingly.

In the circuit court of the State of Oregon, for Douglas county, Sol Williams, Plaintiff, vs. Sallie Williams, Defendant.

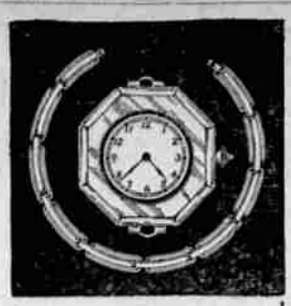
To Sallie Williams, the above-named defendant:
