GET READY TO PAY YOUR WAR TAX

Three Per Cent Is the Amount Set By Government On Many Articles.

AUTOMOBILES INCLUDED

Inventory Must Be Made at Once and Returns Filed Within Thirty Days—Blanks Will Be Furnished.

Editor News: I am now advised that the war revenue bill became effective this morning, and all tobacco dealers are required to take inventory as at this date and to hold the same until appropriate forms are sent them from this office on which to make required report.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 4, 1917.

In addition to the tax on tobacco, cigars, cigarettes and spirals, I enclose extracts from the act, showing the portion of the act which becomes effective on this date.

I would esteem it a favor if you could have this information published in your paper in its next issue, as a news item, so that the public may be informed, and prepare to meet the provisions of this new law.

The war revenue bill of October 3, 1917, which became effective yesterday, October 4, 1917, imposes taxes as follows:

On all articles hereinafter set forth, sold by manufacturers, producers or importers on and after October 4, 1917.

More than \$1.50 and not more than \$2.00, 8c per gallon.

More than \$2.00 and not more than \$3.00, 10c per gallon.

More than \$3.00 and not more than \$4.00, 15c per gallon.

More than \$4.00, 20c per gallon.

Enfermented grape juice, soft drinks, etc., sold by manufacturers, producers or importers and ginger ale, etc., and other carbonated water or beverages manufactured or sold by the manufacturer, producer or importer of carbonic acid gas used in carbonating the same, 1c per gallon.

Natural mineral waters, or table waters sold by producer or holder or importer at over 10 cents per gallon, 1c per gallon.

Carbonic acid gas, sold by the manufacturer, producer or importer thereof, 5c per lb.

Moving picture films which have not been exposed, one-tenth cent per linear foot.

Positive moving picture films ready for projection, one-half cent per linear foot.

A war tax of three per cent is made on the following:

On all automobiles, automobile trucks, automobile wagons and motorcycles.

On all piano players, graphophones, phonographs, talking machines and records for the same.

On all jewelry, real or imitation.

On all cameras, tennis rackets, golf clubs, base ball bats, lacrosse sticks, balls of all kinds including base balls, foot balls, tennis balls, golf balls, lacrosse balls, billiard and pool balls, fishing rods and reels, billiard and pool tables, chess and checker boards and pieces, dice, games and parts of games, except playing cards and children's toys and games.

Glowing gum or substitute therefor, perfumes, essences, extracts, toilet waters, cosmetics, petroleum jelly, hair oils, pomades, hair dressings, hair restorers, hair dyes, tooth and mouth washes, deodorizers, tooth pastes, aromatic caustics, toilet soaps or powders, or any similar substances.

On all piano players, graphophones, phonographs, talking machines and records for the same.

On all jewelry, real or imitation.

On all cameras, tennis rackets, golf clubs, base ball bats, lacrosse sticks, balls of all kinds including base balls, foot balls, tennis balls, golf balls, lacrosse balls, billiard and pool balls, fishing rods and reels, billiard and pool tables, chess and checker boards and pieces, dice, games and parts of games, except playing cards and children's toys and games.

stance, article or preparation, by whatever name known or distinguished, which are used or applied or intended to be used or applied for toilet purposes.

Pills, tablets, powders, tinctures, lozenges or lozenges, syrups, medical cordials or bitters, anodynes, tonics, plasters, liniments, salves, ointments, pastes, drops, waters (except those taxed under section 314 of the war revenue act—which refers to fruit juices, carbonated waters, etc.) essences, spirits, oils and all medical preparations, compounds or compositions whatsoever, the manufacturer or producer of which claims to have any private formula, secret or occult art for making or preparing same, or has or claims to have any exclusive right or title to making or preparing same, or which are prepared, uttered, vended or exposed for sale under any letters patent or trade mark, etc.

A record should be kept of the following showing the exact quantity of each article sold and such record will in due course be verified by a revenue officer:

Prepared syrups or extracts, sold by manufacturers, producers or importers.

For not more than \$1.50 per gallon, 8c per gallon.

More than \$1.50 and not more than \$2.00, 10c per gallon.

More than \$2.00 and not more than \$3.00, 15c per gallon.

More than \$3.00, 20c per gallon.

Enfermented grape juice, soft drinks, etc., sold by manufacturers, producers or importers and ginger ale, etc., and other carbonated water or beverages manufactured or sold by the manufacturer, producer or importer of carbonic acid gas used in carbonating the same, 1c per gallon.

Natural mineral waters, or table waters sold by producer or holder or importer at over 10 cents per gallon, 1c per gallon.

Carbonic acid gas, sold by the manufacturer, producer or importer thereof, 5c per lb.

The radiator of the machine was punctured, allowing the water to run out and the car was taken to a local garage for repairs.

In a letter to Attorney L. B. Sandblast, of this city, Dr. Vincil, who is stationed at Fort Columbia, Wash., tells of life at that delightful army post. The doctor expects to spend the winter there, and from his vivid description of Fort Columbia it must be a beautiful place. While at Fort Riley, Kans., where the doctor spent the greater part of the summer receiving instruction in the duties devolving upon his department, it is stated that he lost about 20 pounds in weight, but that he never felt better. At present he is gaining in flesh, but expects to keep in training that will maintain him in his present excellent form. Like all of the officers and men in the service, Dr. Vincil is anxiously looking to the time when himself and others in his department will be ordered to the front for business.
