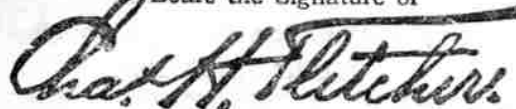

NATION IS ASKED TO ECONOMIZE

Room For Every Patriotic American in Hoover's Army Of Food Savers.

MUST ELIMINATE WASTE

Not Necessary to Stint Ourselves But We Can Back Our Boys at the Front by Conserving the Food Supply.

President Wilson, in a recent speech, said:

"There is a price which is too great to pay for peace and that price can be put in one word. One cannot pay the price of self-respect. One cannot pay the price of duties abdicated, of opportunities neglected, of character, national character, vindicated and exemplified in action."

Our boys are in France to vindicate America. They are offering their lives to make the world safe for democracy. Can we do less than back them up by furnishing the money and the supplies to keep them in fighting trim?

There is room for every patriotic American in Hoover's army of food savers. October 28 to November 1 is pledge card week on food conservation. You can do your bit by signing the pledge not to waste food. The wheat shortage throughout the world is enormous, and unless we conserve our supply of wheat our allies will go short. This is no time to say "lookout for number one, feed America first and let Europe starve if it must." If we are to win this war we must share our wheat and meat, our fats and sugar with the non-combatants, as well as the soldiers of Europe. They are fighting our battle in France just as much as our own boys are. The one big service which we can render Europe in addition to sending men and money is to send food. Even if it means sacrifice to every home in America, which it will not, we should still be willing to send food to our allies. The time has come when we must eliminate waste. It is important to save food right now.

We need not stint ourselves, but we can eat more home grown vegetables, more corn products, chicken and fish in place of beef and pork, and use less meat.

We here at home are not asked to give our lives, nor to undertake the hardships and dangers of life in the trenches, but we are asked to help back up our boys at the front by conserving our food supplies. Are you willing to do your part?

MISS RUTH CORBETT TO ASSIST "HOOVER DRIVE"

Win A has been received from headquarters that Miss Ruth Corbett, home demonstrator, will take an active part in the "Hoover Drive" in Douglas county. Miss Corbett has a knowledge of the conservation principles, and will be of much assistance to the county executive committee in bringing to the attention of our people the important matter of food conservation and substitution.

The executive committee, met at the office of Chairman Edly last night, to further plan for the campaign and many matters of interest were discussed. Mrs. G. L. Flint was elected as a member of the committee. Reports from headquarters indicate a great interest throughout the state, and the people are commencing to appreciate the importance of the "Hoover Drive."

FOOD CONSERVATION SUBSTITUTION ARROWS

Not all of us can serve in the trenches, or risk our lives going over the top, or see our man's land, but all of us can take part in Hoover's Drive to save wheat and meat.

We are not asked to stint ourselves or go without food, but simply to eat wisely and without waste.

Remember the person who wastes food during war time is giving aid to the enemy.

This war will not be won on the battle lines alone, but on the bread line as well.
