

# ARMY Y. M. C. A. AT FORT STEVENS

A Great Investment For The Soldiers and One That Is Duly Appreciated.

## WORK IS PROGRESSING

Labor Troubles Have Retarded Work To Some Degree But Building Will Soon Be Ready For Occupancy.

If the people of Roseburg who subscribed to the work of the Army Y. M. C. A. could see the work that that institution is conducting at Fort Stevens where over two thousand soldiers are stationed, they would be delighted with the good use to which their money is being placed.

It was only a few days after the boys arrived at Fort Stevens that Dr. H. R. Marsh, formerly superintendent of schools at Glendale, Ore., near where Col. Ellis' office and asked for permission to erect a Y. M. C. A. building. The colonel asked how long it would be before the building would be erected and the doctor informed him that it would be ready for occupancy within two weeks after it was started. Permission was granted for the construction of the building, several weeks being required in obtaining the necessary orders from the war department at Washington, D. C., and within an almost incredible length of time, the contract was let, the material was on the ground and the foundation started. The building was well under way when labor troubles arose at Astoria and other nearby cities and progress was halted, and it seemed that the building would remain unfinished for some time. But when the matter was placed before Col. Ellis he immediately detailed several men who have ability as carpenters and within the stated time the building was thrown open for the use of the men.

At the present time it is not quite completed. The windows and doors have not been put in and there is still considerable work to do in finishing up the interior, but this does not hinder the operation of the organization for already they have furnished entertainment, while every afternoon and evening the fellows congregate in large numbers to box, wrestle or enjoy a musical hour. There are a large number of musicians in camp and the piano is kept busy at all times while the popular songs are learned as fast as they can be obtained.

However, the Y. M. C. A. workers at Fort Stevens did not wait for the building before starting their labors. Immediately following their arrival they ordered base ball outfits, foot balls, medicine balls and such other sporting articles as could be used for the season and gave them out to the various camps. are under the direction of W. V. Rucker, of Portland, who has been associated for several years with the physical department of the Portland association. He is an excellent manager and is rapidly getting system into the athletics at the fort. A foot ball schedule has been completed and the season started. Sunday, October 7, the 4th company team played the 3rd company from Eugene a 6-0 game. The Roseburg aggregation showed up much better than had been expected and the boys are greatly elated and ready to meet all comers. The Eugene team is composed almost entirely of seasoned foot ball veterans and a score such as was made with clean, hard playing on both sides shows that the spirit of the Roseburg team when coupled with experience and practice will give them a formidable foot ball squad. On the same day the 11th company from Marshfield defeated a picked team of "regs" by 15-0. All these games are under the auspices and management of the Army Y. M. C. A.

The "Y" building will be used for church services on Sundays and on week days will be thrown open to the fellows for a lounge place for study, letter writing, etc. A school is to be started taking up the subjects most preferred by the men, a canvass having been taken to see the studies most favored. A business course, mathematics and French have been almost unanimously selected and large classes in each will soon be started. At frequent intervals entertainers of national reputation will be brought to the fort and the boys will be given a chance to hear some of the finest talent. As Fort Stevens is off the regular line of travel it will not receive all the numbers that go to American Lake, but all of the more important numbers will be brought here on their way from California to the Washington mobilization camp.

During the winter months, the "Y" is going to take the place of the home for the many boys located at Fort Stevens and there is no doubt but that it will be a most excellent substitute. It is doing a great work and the fellows have a warm place in their hearts for the organization and its representatives.

# C. COMPANY WILL LEAVE MEDFORD

C company, 3rd Oregon infantry will depart from Medford today, Captain J. J. Crossley having received orders recently to that effect.

The company is ordered to mobilize with the several other companies of the regiment now on guard duty at the regimental headquarters at Clackamas, from where they will proceed in about ten days to join the rest of the regiment at Camp Greene, the big cantonment at Charlotte, N. C.

C company has been on continuous guard duty since it was called out in service on March 25 last, and prior to going to Medford was on guard duty in the Vancouver sector up around Portland.

The other companies of the 3rd Oregon still on guard duty which will mobilize at Clackamas to prepare for the trip to Charlotte, N. C., are A company, on duty at St. Johns; B company, on duty in Washington state; D company, on duty at Astoria; E company, on duty at La Grande; and M company, on duty at The Dalles.

When these companies reach Charlotte it will be the first time the 3rd Oregon has been together as a regiment since last March. The rest of the regiment went to Charlotte two weeks ago.

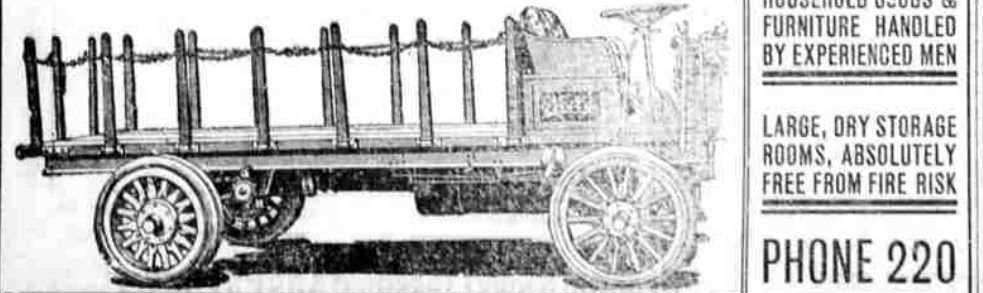
