

COUNCIL ACCEPTS PAVING PLANS

Hamilton Street, From Orcutt
to Waite, Will Undergo
Improvements.

CURFEW LAW PASSES

Ordinance Providing for Rose Street
Improvement Up For Second
Reading—No Remon-
strances Received.

At the regular meeting of the council last night the plans and specifications for the paving of Hamilton street from Orcutt to Waite were read for the third time and accepted. The plans call for asphalt surface, twenty feet wide, but owing to the inclemency of the weather actual work on the proposed improvement will probably be delayed for some time, as the asphalt must be put down under dry conditions. However, this matter was not fully settled and will be taken up again at the next regular session for final disposition.

The curfew ordinance which prohibits any persons from loitering about the streets on frequenting places of amusement after nine p. m. unless accompanied by parents or

guardian, was up for third reading and was passed by the majority vote of the council.

The ordinance reducing the bond of the city treasurer from \$15,000 to \$10,000 was read for the third time and passed.

The ordinance providing for the contemplated improvements of Rose street to which an emergency clause was attached, was read for the second time and will receive the final approval of the body at their next regular session. No remonstrances have been received and as the time is limited for the completion of this work before the fall rain set in it is probable that actual construction will commence just as soon as the necessary publication and other routine is dispensed of. As the specification call for cement paving the rainy weather will not necessarily delay the improvements and once started the work will be rushed to completion.

City Recorder R. J. Whipple informed the body that the city was entirely out of stamps and owing to the fact that nearly two hundred letters were sent to be forwarded from his office as notification of delinquent payments on bonded property, it would be necessary that a supply be secured at once and a warrant for \$10 was ordered drawn to be used for this purpose.

Mayor Rice, on account of illness, was not able to be present, and Councilman Hamilton took the chair of ex-officio. Kidd, McClintock, Powell and Creason answered roll call.

WOMEN GO TO FRANCE

Forty or Fifty Go Over to Foreign Lands Every Month to Look After and Care For Our Soldier Boys—A Great Work.

"The saving of a soldier is as essential as the making of one, and when I say 'saving,' you will understand that I mean the preservation of his mental, moral and physical being so that he can continue to be the highest type of American citizen." It was so that United States Senator George E. Chamberlain summed up his appreciation of the value of the war work being done by the Y. M. C. A. at home and abroad when asked for an expression of opinion concerning the war work fund campaign now under way. With the single exception of President Wilson there is probably no one in this country so competent to speak with knowledge and authority on matters pertaining to the war as Senator Chamberlain.

An organization that devotes its energies to care of the moral and physical welfare of the young man at home," continued the senator, "can and should be entrusted with the moral and physical welfare of that same young man when he becomes a soldier and is sent to a foreign land to fight the battles of civilization."

The saving of soldiers is just what the Y. M. C. A. is doing for our country in the home cantonments and behind the fighting fronts in Europe. The necessity for a continuation of the work of the association must be apparent to all good citizens. The campaign now in progress for raising a war work fund for the use of the association in the army and navy has the endorsement and approval of the administration and the cabinet officers who are the heads of these departments of the government. Every citizen who loves his country and every young man who remains at home, but whose heart and hope goes with the boys who must fight our battles in a foreign land, should spare no effort in helping to provide the necessary funds to aid the Y. M. C. A. work. I speak strongly on this subject because I feel strongly and I feel strongly because I have an intimate and first hand knowledge of the task that is before us and feel the hardships and tribulations that must be borne on the shoulders of the brave and youth of our land."

Forty to fifty patriotic American women are being sent to France every month to work in Y. M. C. A. units, to serve the soldiers who have gone over there to fight this country's battles. These women come from the finest homes in the land. Most of them are women of wealth, who, seeing an opportunity to become a factor in the war, having volunteered their services. They willingly do the hardest kind of work. From six o'clock in the morning until late at night they serve the men at the cantonments, wait on tables, wash the dishes and do their own work. They are women of refinement who have never done this class of work before. Their presence has done much to keep the American soldier morally clean than any other influence in France.

They have around the cantonments just to hear their voices, for it reminds them of home, such as they were used to at home.

Mrs. Arthur Glavin, one of America's foremost women, is serving a campaign in an American camp overseas. Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. is another that is serving and there are scores of others fully as prominent.

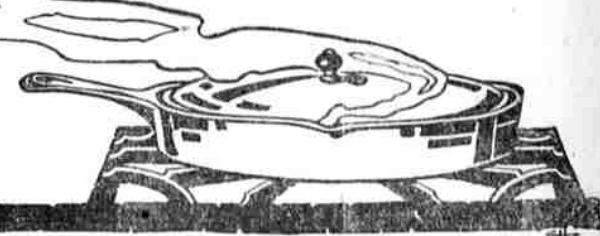
