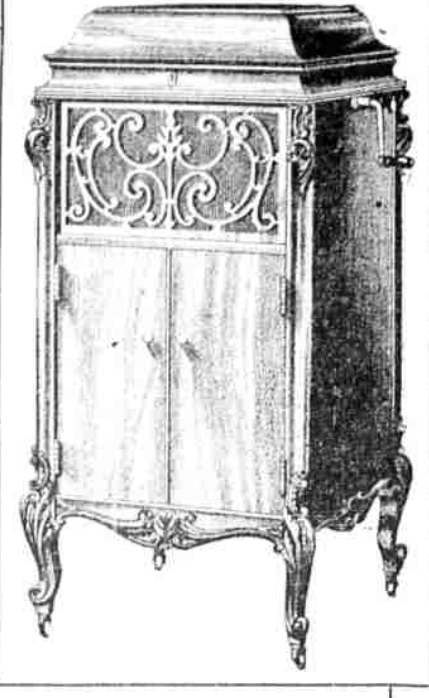

WOUNDED AT VERDUN

Ambulance Drivers Terribly Mangled
When a Boche Projectile Bursts
Within Their Midst—
Receive Medals.

AN ATLANTIC HOPE Nov 11—One American mother, Mrs. McQuillen, of Philadelphia, gave proof today of her Spartanlike spirit of sacrifice to patriotism, when she met her wounded son, Price McQuillen at the head of a landing stage when an American steamer came to McQuillen bobbing on a crutch with his entire right leg gone, and proudly wearing his uniform as a member of the American field ambulance service, was greeted by his mother with the words: "Welcome home son," and the two fell into each other's arms.

With McQuillen, also on crutches, was his chum, Wayne Vetterline, also of Philadelphia.

Both boys were badly wounded before Verdun on August 2. They had three wounded French soldiers in their ambulance and were holding in a trench while under shell fire when a projectile exploded in their midst. The four French wounded were killed, the ambulance wrecked and both Americans terribly mangled. When they recovered they found they had received the Medal Militaire and the Croix de Guerre and palm and star.

The ship which brought McQuillen and Vetterline carried Representative Small McCannell, of Illinois, just back from a survey of all the European fronts. He left the ship yesterday morning to catch a train to Washington to report to President Wilson.

Other passengers told of their ship repelling a submarine attack when in the Irish sea one day out of a British port. Passengers in the ship at 4:15 one evening were startled by the sudden roar of the air gun, directed to one of the prize gunnery areas of the navy. Those who rushed out on deck caught a glimpse of a horribly submerged submarine.

On that same evening the liner picked up two sails from ships in distress, both of whom reported submarine attacks.
