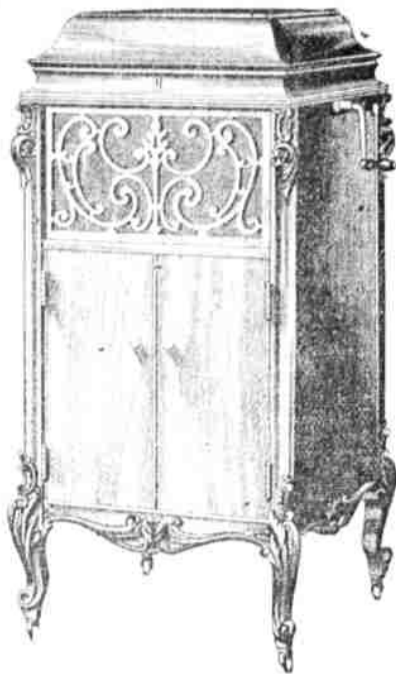

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FRIGHTFUL CONDITION RETURNING CHILDREN

Frank Work since his arrival in France has been received from Dr. C. H. Moore, well known Portland physician, who enlisted under the Red Cross to serve in the children's division abroad.

The child's condition that has greeted his eyes since he has returned to his work, is due to the return of the "epidemic" sent back from territories occupied by Germans.

The reports are returning through Switzerland at the rate of one a day, reads a letter received by a friend in Portland. Forty to fifty per cent of these reports are children and people who have been greatly affected by the war and they are being sent back to their homes to care for their own relatives who are returning them. Debating has become a science at Astoria.

The children's section of the Red Cross is not doing a small hospital at Astoria to assist the French government in the great task, debasing bathing and clothing these people and then distributing to different parts of France. Each person's story is carefully recorded and at the end of the war these people may be published. Imagine having all our food spit in before your face for nine months—a national insult.

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EIGHT THOUSAND MEN SENT FROM CAMP LEWIS

CAMP LEWIS Tacoma, Nov. 20—Official release was made yesterday at the office of Major General H. A. Greene, in command of this camp, of the fact that some men drafted from the western department have been transferred from Camp Lewis to other camps, and may see service in France before the end of the war.

The planes to which the western men were sent is being established, however. The movement being now completed and the men having arrived at their destinations permission to publish was given.

The last of the 8000 troops left camp a week ago. For eight days previous to that date the movement had been in progress.

The arrival of the 14th and 44th infantry regiments, regulars, from Vancouver barracks brought the total of men in camp back to about 10,000.

NOTED PIONEER OF COOS COUNTY DEAD

John Haines, one of Coos county's oldest and most respected citizens died Saturday night at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James Armstrong, Unit, Ore., as he was familiarly known and he lived, would have been 85 years of age next January 1st, but he has been a resident of Coos county since 1850.

Mr. Haines had a long and successful career in the lumber industry and was one of the first to settle in Coos county. He was a noted pioneer and his death is a great loss to the community.
