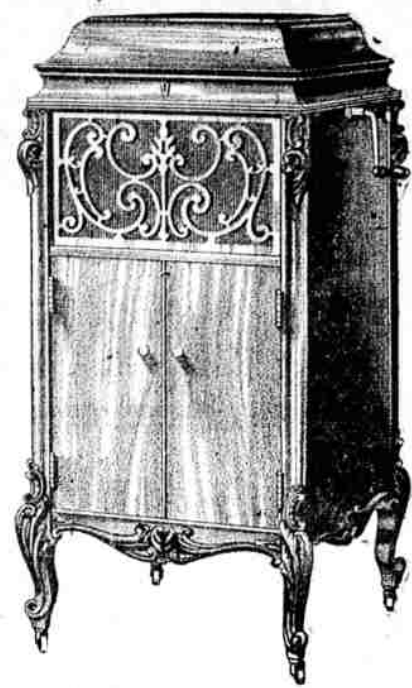

SUGAR-SAVING CAMPAIGN ON.

(Continued from page 1.)

1. Do not use coffee and tea at all.
2. Use fresh fruits or baked apples, etc., instead of sweet puddings, or use a salad in place of dessert.
3. Use sweet fruits like dates, raisins, figs, dried cherries, or dried prunes (cooked) with breakfast cereals instead of sugar.
4. Use honey, syrup, glucose and molasses in place of part or all of the sugar in cooking.
5. Do not frost cakes.
6. Jellies and preserves already made will supply part of the sugar needed in the diet.
7. Make or buy no candy. Use nuts, raisins, dates and popcorn this Thanksgiving and Xmas.
8. Defer the making of jellies from canned fruit juices until after January 1, 1918.
9. Limit the sugar used in all cooking and served on your table in any form, including candy if you must have it (if candy is eaten make it part of the meal and include it in the allowance of sugar for the day) to six level tablespoonsful per person per day (two cups for a family of five) for the remainder of the year.
10. Every member of the household must do his share. The housewife cannot do much without the support and co-operation of every member of her family.
11. What does your kitchen card say about sugar?
