Examinees Return.

The Portland Bridge Co. was awarded the contract for the first bridge which is to be erected a short distance in a southerly direction from Winstons. This strip of the highway which eliminates the dangerous grades of the famous Roberts mountain will not, in all probability, be ready for use next summer, as has been predicted.
