BONDS IN TRADE.

"I hope that the merchants of the
country, upon a more careful consid-
eration of the subject, will discon-
tinue their efforts to sell merchan-
dise and take liberty loan bonds in
payment," says Secretary McAdoo.
The secretary states that he has
no doubt that merchants offering to
take liberty loan bonds in exchange
for merchandise are actuated by pa-
triotic motives, but that such trans-
actions tend to defeat a primary ob-
ject of the bond sales, as they dis-
courage thrift and increase expen-
ditures. Bonds so taken in exchange
in most cases are immediately sold
in the open market, which tends to
suppress the market price and ad-
versely affects sales of future issues.

The strongest efforts are made by
the treasury department to have
these government bonds purchased
for permanent investment by the
people and paid for out of savings,
thus not only providing funds for
the government but effecting conser-
vation of labor and material; ex-
changing them for merchandise
therefore defeats this purpose.

TWELVE KILLED IN
TORPEDOING SHIPOregon Boy Victim of Menin-
gitis—Medical Corps Man
Hurt in Action.

PACKERS PROFITEERING

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—The
steamship Cork was torpedoed, ac-
cording to news just received here,
and seven passengers and five of the
crew were lost.

One Dead, One Hurt.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—First
Lieut. H. A. Brown, of the medical
corps, of Cincinnati, attached to
British forces, was recently wounded
in an engagement, according to in-
formation furnished by General
Pershing. There were no details,
but it is understood that the lieuten-
ant was not seriously hurt. The
fighting occurred December 31. Hu-
bert Roberts, of Warren, Ore., is re-
ported to have died of meningitis.

Packers Control Trade.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—From
data obtained from confidential let-
ters and telegrams secured from files
in the packers' offices, Attorney
Honey, prosecuting the cases for the
government, charged that five big
firms control prices and division of
live stock purchases throughout the
United States, and were thus enabled
to eliminate competition.

Bank Examiner Promoted.
SALEM, Jan. 28.—State Supt. of
Banks Sargent has resigned his
position to become examiner for the
federal reserve bank, of San Fran-
cisco, covering Oregon, Washington,
Idaho, California, Arizona and Ne-
vada. He will assume his duties
February.

Blizzard Raging.
NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—A terrific
blizzard has tied up the freight traf-
fic over many of the eastern rail-
roads.

Will Hurry Appeal.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—The su-
preme court has agreed to expedite
the appeal on proceedings brought by
the Associated Press to prevent the
International News Service from
pirating news. April 15 has been fixed
for the hearing.

CONVICTED BOOTLEGGING

Medford Mail: After insisting
upon a jury trial, J. D. Buckley,
charged with Rankin Estes and Col-
lins Reed, with bootlegging, decid-
ed to plead guilty before Justice
Glenn Taylor yesterday afternoon,
and was accordingly given a fine of
\$25 and costs which he paid. He
was also given a suspended sentence
of 60 days in jail, which will be held
over him pending good behavior. Ac-
cording to the authorities Buckley
was not bootlegging but went to
Reed's house Thursday night to get
a supply. He has been one of the
best customers the bootleggers have
had, however, and unless he reforms
may expect a stiffer sentence next
time.

Collins Reed, familiarly known
as "Coll," also pleaded guilty and as
this is his second offense he was
given the maximum, one year in
jail. It was finally decided to sus-
pend Reed's jail sentence with the
understanding that he leave Med-
ford and not return within a year.
This Reed has agreed to do and will
go to Roseburg to live with his son.

COMMISSIONERS SECURE
SIX MILE RIGHT-OF-WAY

County Commissioners W. E. St.
John, of Sutherlin, and Ben Nichols,
of Riddle, left late this morning for
the vicinity of Winston where they
will spend the day securing right of
way deeds for the new Robert mon-
tain cutoff. According to Mr. Nich-
ols, the ranchers in that vicinity
whose property is effected by the new
survey, are in most instances very
fair in their claims for damages.
Only one case has cropped out so
far wherein the property owner asked
exorbitant reparations.

Six miles of the right of way
north of Myrtle Creek, in fact about
half of the entire strip, has been se-
cured so it was announced today
and the commissioners feel certain
that all deeds will be in the hands of
the county court within a short
time.
