SYLTON VALLEY PARENT TEACHERS ASSN. BUSY

A number of the members of the Sylton Valley Parent-Teachers Association met at the school grounds last Friday, laden with hoes, rakes, spades, trees, shrubs and plants of various description to assist the teacher and pupils in celebrating Arbor Day and beautifying the school grounds.

Flower gardens were made and the children had great sport in planting the trees and rose bushes and naming them after different people of the district. A strip of ground has been plowed (by the children) on the south and east end of the school lot and a certain number of feet assigned to each child for vegetable gardening, and some have set out onions, lettuce, cabbage and parsley plants.

The Parent-Teachers Association has purchased dishes and cooking utensils and Miss MacIver, assisted by the older girls, has been serving hot drink or hot soups with the noon day lunches, which has been very much enjoyed, and proven very beneficial in many ways. The school gardens may contribute their share to the lunch later.

A short program followed the planting. Readings were given by Florence Hoffman and Amanda Foster, followed by the reading of the instructions issued by the O. A. C. on industrial projects which the pupils intend to take up this year.

A Red Cross unit was organized and Mrs. R. L. Thomas was chosen leader and Mrs. C. W. Bradford, secretary-treasurer, and the first meeting of the unit will be held at the home of Mrs. Calhoun next Thursday afternoon and some definite work for the Red Cross will be assigned.
