## SMILEAGE CAMPAIGN ON, EVERYBODY BUYS

The Girls' National Honor Guard organization is in charge of the "smileage" campaign in this city starting today and every patriotic citizen of the city is urged to respond liberally in this worthy project. By purchasing a smileage book for a soldier boy one is providing a big ray of sunshine in their turbulent army existence and it should be the patriotic duty of loyal Americans who have the welfare of the sons of Old Glory at heart to see that the latter are supplied with a smileage book. The girls of the Honor Guard will sell these books about the streets for the next few days and all those who do not have the opportunity of procuring one can obtain the little "smile provoker" at the office of the Commercial Abstract Co., from J. E. McClintock, who is looking after the interests of the smileage drive in Douglas county.

In four short days, between this and Thursday night, the people of Oregon are asked to donate the funds which will provide American soldier boys with no less than 100,000 admissions to high class entertainments, coming to their camps and cantonments under supervision of the United States government.

In nearly every army camp the government has already provided one of the famous Liberty theatres, where the smileage entertainments will be presented. It has definitely, though indirectly, directed the arrangement and booking of troupes and attractions, to travel the circuit of these theatres. American citizens are asked to make it possible for every soldier boy to enjoy the entertainments by providing the admission fee.

This is being done through the purchase and distribution of \$1 and \$5 smileage books, made up of 5 cent coupons, since seats at the Liberty shows are so cost but such nominal sums as 15, 20 and 25 cents.

Officials of the drive are particularly desirous that no one who has the inclination to add to the scant pleasures of the training or fighting soldier boy and a dollar, or two, or five or ten, which they will contribute, shall neglect the pleasure because they do not have a relative or friend to whom to send the books. Provision has been made to get the ticket books not directed to any particular soldier into the hands of some lad who would otherwise go without.

## MEDFORD HOME GUARD LOST IN THE SHUFFLE

What has become of Medford's home guard? says the Medford Sun. When we had a county full of soldiers, and the city was alive with young men of military age, there was a home guard drilling every night or so; now without a soldier within three or four hundred miles, there is not a sign of guard, or gun or even a manual of arms.

If a squad of I. W. W. terrorists, with a load of dynamite, came down from the Siskiyou and requested all the bank deposits in the city, there would be a couple of policemen and a sheriff in Jacksonville to oppose them.

If conditions on the coast should suddenly make it imperative to guard the railroad tunnels and bridges again, or look after our water supply, nothing could be done hereabouts until outside help came in.

If Medford ever needed a home guard it seems to us, the need is now. A well drilled company of twenty men, fully armed, would be of tremendous value to the city, in case of any emergency—whether it be invasion, riot or merely fire.

We are short man power. It would seem only common prudence to make what man power we have available in case of need. There is no cause for alarm. The war will probably end without any disturbances within 3,000 miles of the Rogue river valley. But far better to be safe than be sorry. As the war happens to look interminable today, it would seem only common sense to revive what means of defense we originally possessed. It could do no harm and it might do a very great deal of good.

### WAGON GRANT BILL HELD.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 15.—Further word as to the progress of the Coos Bay wagon road grant bill in congress was received by Attorney General Brown today in a letter from representative Hawley, who stated that the sub-committee has agreed to withhold further action on the bill until the state makes its showing.

Mr. Hawley writes that, all told, the state and counties will receive

about \$500,000 from the measure if it goes through in its original form. A representative of the department of justice is coming west to confer with the governor and attorney general on the matter, and Mr. Hawley is confident, if a proper showing is made, all of the money may be saved for the state.
