SALEM, Or., March 22.—Insurance on the lives of Oregon citizens showedd an increase of \$27,000,000 in 1917 over the provious year, according to a staement issued by Insurance Commissioner Wells, and surance Commissioner Wells, and the total amount of insurance held in the state is \$176,311,626. This figure is based on the reports of 48 companies for the year. Total premiums collected on insurance for the year is \$5,424,000 and dividends returned are estimated to be over one million dollars.

CLOCKS TURNED FOR-WARD MARCH 31ST

Clocks of the United States will be Clocks of the United States will be turned forward at 2 a. m. Sunday, March 31, and for the following five months daylight will be saved. President Wilson signed the bill Tuesday that puts this law into effect, to continue until the last Sunday in October, when they will be put back to run again on "sun time."

put back to run again on "sun time."

Saving daylight is a war measure, and its object is to give an additional hour in the morning. It brings the day's work well within the daylight period and saves eyes and artificial light. It gives the war gardener more time in the morning and afternoon in which to encourage his crop. Among other practical results it is estimated that it will save 1,000,000 tons of coal a year and will save gas and electric light bills to the tune of \$40,000,000 a year; it will increase foodstuffs production by giving more daylight hours for both recreation and work; it will speed up freight movements by giving an extra hour of daylight for overtime work at the docks and terminals; it will stimulate all athletic sports which can be started at a later than the same of sports which can be started at a later hour; it will be special benefit to women in industry, as they will stop work at the time of day when their

work at the time of day when their nervous strain is greatest.

The practicability and efficiency of the plan have been demonstrated in many European countries, and was invented by Benjamin Franklin, who published the idea in the Journal de Paris in 1784 in an article on "Eco-nomical Project for Diminishing the Cost of Light."
