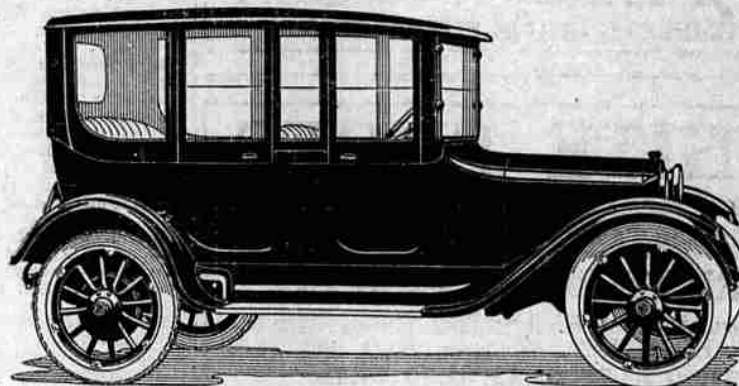

Salute "Old Glory" whenever and wherever she flutters, but don't let your patriotism stop at that.

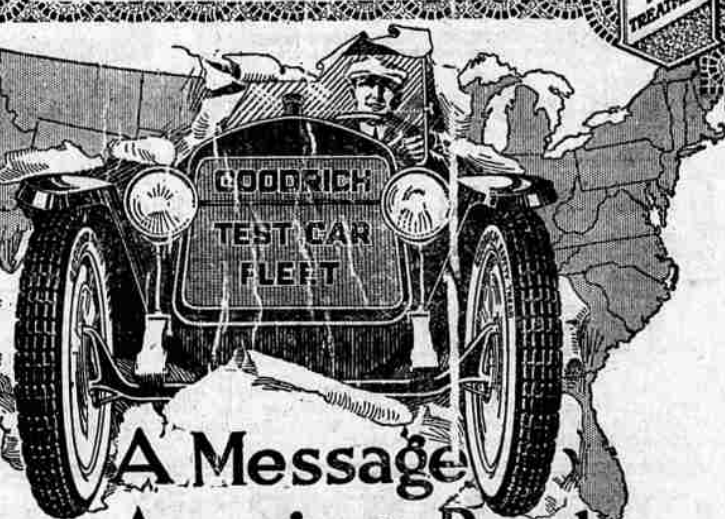
