**DON'T LOOK FOR PRAISE.**

Uncle Sam asks us to save in order to help win the war—to save so that we can help finance the fighting, so that we can help prevent the needless diversion of men and money from fighting industries to industries that deal in non-essentials. We do it—at least some of us do it to some extent—and then we act, deep down inside anyway as though we had done something that had earned us a hero medal of some kind.

Have you really stopped to think what a joke that is? Have you really thought how absurd it is when we take it that way and begin to swell up with pride over our patriotic sacrifice?

Here is what it comes to: When Uncle Sam asks us to save up a little to help win the war, he asks us to lay up a little something for a rainy day or for dependent old age. He asks us to moderate our pace, to get down to plain living, to cut out frills that lose us sleep and strength and health, to quit a foolish competition in spending that frazzles our nerves, shatters our peace of mind, and sends contentment shrieking out of our lives. He asks us to save up a little store that we can use either to shelter us from the wintry blasts of impetuous old age or, if we please, spend in one shot that will really get us something when the storm of war is over—a coveted car, a building site, that "home of our own," a trip to the battlefields of Europe.

He asks us to save to help win the war; but that means that he asks us to form the habit of thrift, which is a little something of forgetting or, indeed, had forgotten. He asks us to stop shooting our money to the birds, recklessness of the future and its bristling storehouse of consequences. He asks us to apportion our income between a reasonable, decent living and a savings fund. He asks us to put that savings into war savings stamps and liberty bonds. He asks us, so that there may be food enough for our fighting men and their allies, to quit stuffing ourselves as though we were being fattened for the table, and to choke off the garbage barrel's fat supply; and when we obey, we benefit our purses and our healths.

In short, when Uncle Sam asks us to save to help win the war, he asks us to do ourselves a great favor; and yet, simply because the need is great and the appeal urgent, and because the nation pleads with us to do this simple thing, we are prone to look upon it as a great favor to the country, and to stick feathers in our hats and go strutting around because we granted it. It's patriotic, all right. It helps the country—not only now, but later; not only for the war, but for the trial of national fiber that comes after the war—but it helps us even more.

And it is so easy, so much more helpful to ourselves than to the country, so small a thing to do compared with what our boys in arms are doing, that it really is a joke to pin roses on ourselves for doing it.

We ought to do it. We must do it. But instead of expecting Uncle Sam to decorate us for heroism, we ought to get on our knees and thank him for the opportunity of getting a little sound sense pounded into us at last. And that goes as to the average individual, and as to the nation and people as a whole.

The liquor interests of the nation are still determined in their efforts to convince the public the president and congress that to carry on the war to a successful end there must be a certain amount of booze manufactured. There's only one way to kill off this liquor agitation until the end of the war and that is to choke the very life out of the "wet" promoters. The world is too busy with important problems to waste any time on booze peddlers and as this particular liquor is not a war necessity why not dismiss the whole proposition by stopping its manufacture until we win the war—and forever thereafter.
