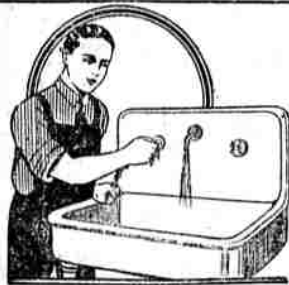

proper forms will be sent you on request.

Talk to your clients about the trading with the enemy act. Remind them all, banks, trust companies, corporations, executors, administrators, trustees, and commercial houses, of their duty to report, of the patriotic service which they perform in so doing, and, if necessary, of the severe penalties that attend delinquency in this respect. Follow up any case where your clients are required by law to report and see that they do it.

Bear the importance of this work in mind in your daily contact with other lawyers, friends, and business associates. If news, even an unverified rumor, reaches you as to any case where it is supposed that enemy property exists, make a note of it and bring the matter to the attention of this office. We will check it up and, if unreported, adopt suitable measures to procure reports.

Talk about the act to your friends, fellow lawyers, judges, and court officials, and thus help us to bring home to them the importance of reporting and of sending us information as to the existence of enemy property.

In this, America's hour of need, if she can not count on the devoted service of the American lawyer behind the lines, to whom may she turn?
