INCREASED TAX NECESSARY.

Secretary McAdoo's position relative to taxation for the coming year was frankly and positively stated in his letter to Majority Leader Kiehn of the house of representatives. He wrote in part:
"We can not afford to rely upon \$4,000,000,000 only for taxation because we shall then have to rely on raising \$20,000,000,000 by loans. This would be a surrender to the policy of high interest rates and inflation, with all their evil consequences."
"If we are to preserve the financial strength of the nation we must do sound and safe things, no matter whether they hurt our pockets or involve sacrifices—sacrifices of a relatively insignificant sort compared with those our soldiers and sailors are making to save the life of the nation."

"The sound thing to do unquestionably is to increase taxation, and the increases should be determined upon promptly and made effective at the earliest possible moment."
The secretary's recommendations briefly are that one-third (estimated at \$8,000,000,000) of the cash expenditures to be made during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919, be provided for by taxation, a real war profits tax at a high rate upon all war profits, a substantial increase in the amount of normal income tax upon all so-called unearned incomes, and heavy taxation upon all luxuries.

So far more than 3,000,000,000 government checks have been sent out by the bureau of war risk insurance, most of which were for allotments and allowances to the families and dependents of the enlisted men in the army and navy. The total disbursements of the bureau up to June 10 were more than \$28,000,000, of which \$7,000,000 was for allotments and allowances. More than \$50,000 checks a month are sent out, approximately 35,000 being mailed out every day. The first checks for the June allotments will be sent out on July 1, just as the first May payments began on June 1. Relatives and dependents of the insured men should remember that the payments for any month can not be mailed out sooner than the first day of the succeeding month.

There is not much difference in actual effect between an American needlessly consuming materials needed by the nation and a German sinking such materials at sea.

WILL ASK PAROLE FOR DARWIN WOOD

Petitions were prepared today by L. A. Liljeqvist for the signatures of Marshfield citizens requesting the paroling of Darwin Wood, former organist at the Orpheum theatre who was convicted of a penitentiary offense and sent to prison on the charge of sending obscene letters through the United States mail, says the Coos Bay Times.

Six months of the sentence was served out by Mr. Wood on June 7 since it was December 7 when he entered the penal institute in Washington. Fifteen months was the sentence.

Mr. Liljeqvist will take the petitions to Portland where they will be presented to United States District Attorney Bert E. Haney for further reference to other officials in the federal court in which Mr. Wood was convicted. Final submission to the parole board is planned.

A letter which reached the little daughter of Mr. Wood living with her mother, from whom the father had parted was the cause of the proceedings. Mr. Wood expects to return to Marshfield to resume his place as organist at the Orpheum theatre. He was known here as an able musician. He was in service in France, carrying an honorable discharge for wounds.

Mr. Wood, brother of Darwin Wood, will aid in securing signatures. Several prominent citizens have offered to use their influence.

Mr. Wood is well known in Roseburg where he held the position as piano player when the Palace theatre was in operation in this city.

CURE FOR MOSQUITOES.

CORVALLIS, July 1.—That the western newt or water-dog is an effective means of getting rid of mosquitoes is pointed out by Dr. A. C. Chandler in an Oregon Agricultural College experiment station bulletin, entitled "The Western Newt or Water-Dog, a Natural Enemy of Mosquitoes."

One or two water-dogs in each rain barrel will be sufficient to keep them clear of mosquito larvae has been conclusively shown, according to Dr. Chandler. The only requisites for their successful exploitation in

this capacity are that the barrels be free from oil, tar, brine, or other injurious substances. The water dogs do not injure the water in any way. Reservoirs, mill ponds, and garden pools could almost invariably be stocked successfully with water-dogs in climates in which they will thrive.

AMERICAN CAMPS SHUTTING OUT FLYS

CAMP KEARNEY, San Diego, Calif., July 1.—The largest single step in the anti-fly campaign here has just been taken by the installation of 3,500 screen doors on mess halls, kitchens, bakeries and other buildings in camp. No building is without its screen doors now and on all where cooking or eating is done or food articles are for sale, as on the regimental exchanges, there are two sets of doors.

To place the double screen door, handsome entry porches, also screens have been built at all entrances where two doors are needed, adding much to the appearance of the rows of mess halls.

"Virtually all buildings here were equipped with window screens when they were built but formerly had only solid wood doors. These now can be left open to increase the amount of air circulating through the buildings, while the new screens prevent flies from entering."

With the double door, sanitary officers say, there is not the slightest excuse for a fly to be found in any mess hall or kitchen.

The doors were placed on the buildings under orders from the war department. It required more than a week for the installation of the first set, which went directly on the buildings, while construction of the screened entries and hanging of the second set required considerable longer.

WARNING SOUNDED BY WELLS.

SALZEM, Or., July 1.—"Be Careful Whom You Hire," is the title of a bulletin issued by State Fire Marshal Harvey Wells to the farmers of the state relative to the gathering of harvest crews for the coming gleanings season. The farmer is urged to ask the prospective hired man whether he is an American citizen and if he is a Red Cross and Liberty bond subscriber.

"If he is a 100 per cent American he will tell you he is known," says the bulletin. "If he is an I. W. W. or an alien enemy he will consider it none of your business. In the latter case do not employ him or do not let your neighbor have him, but report him to the sheriff so that the officer can keep watch while the man is in your community. Do your part in this direction and you will be assisting the home guards."

Farmers are warned not to permit men to smoke around the harvesters or in the grain fields. Many fires are attributed to the careless handling of matches by smokers.
Persons who live in small towns or at sidings where warehouses for storing grain are located are advised to procure a supply of ladders for use in the event of fires. Barrels and buckets should be kept at hand with plenty of water. Without this equipment, the bulletin warns, any number of persons willing to fight fire would be reduced to helplessness should warehouse fire occur.

GIRL FALLS FROM TRAIN.

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., June 31.—Mende Helden, 6-year-old daughter of Mrs. M. W. Helden, of Woodlawn, Pa., rolled out of a berth and through the window of a sleeping car of a Santa Fe train on the Mojave desert at 3 o'clock yesterday morning and was not missed until the train had traveled 35 miles. Three hours later the crew of a freight train found the child, who was unconscious, and took her to a hospital at Victorville. She will recover.

WHEATLESS PROGRAM WILL CEASE JULY 5TH

Because of the inability of the grain corporation to secure sufficient flour to make any further shipment until the new crop of wheat is available, Mr. W. B. Ayer, federal food administrator for Oregon, has directed that the wheatless program shall cease to operate on July 5, and beginning with that date the sale of flour will be resumed on the fifty-five basis, that is to say, the former limitation as to the sale will apply and substitutes equal in weight must be purchased by the consumer at the same time.

All persons who are hoarding flour should take warning that the surplus flour must be returned to dealers without further delay. Two farmers in Tillamook county were recently fined for hoarding flour, one of them in the sum of \$500 and the other in the sum of \$250. People in Douglas county have received notices with regard to the return of flour to which they have made no response. They should give the matter attention.
