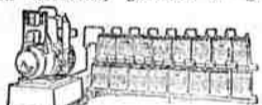

GERMANS ARE BURIED WITH MILITARY HONORS

LONDON, June 29.—In two village churchyards near London three German aviators killed in a night air raid on the metropolis on Sunday, May 19, were buried three days afterwards while inquests over bodies of their victims were being conducted in London.
In one churchyard two Germans were buried with military honors. At another cemetery services were held over the body of a German aviator which had been found in the wreckage of his flying machine. The casket, covered with a German flag, was conveyed to the bury ground on a gun carriage, followed by officers and men of the Royal air force. Allied aviators flew over the churchyard during the ceremonies.
